# 2017-2018 (YTD) 3<sup>rd</sup> Advisory Data Report

- **Key Outcomes Examined in this Report Include:**
  - In Seat Attendance
  - Chronic Truancy Rates
  - Referrals for Education Neglect
  - Referrals to the Family Court
- The data contained in this report was provided by each respective agency, namely DCPS, PCSB, CFSA, CSSD, and OAG, and compiled by the CJCC.

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# Data Timeframe for 2017-2018 (YTD) and 2016-2017 (YTD)

- **DCPS\* data is aligned with the following schedule**
  - Start of SY 2017-2018 (August 21) to June 13, 2018 (Total of 180 school days)<sub>1</sub>
  - Start of SY 2016-2017 (August 22) to June 14, 2017 (Total of 180 school days)
- **PCSB data is aligned with the following schedule**
  - Start of SY 2017-2018 (varies) to June 30, 2018. (Total school days varies by school.)
  - Start of SY 2016-2017 (varies) to June 30, 2017. (Total school days varies by school.)

\*Data from 11 DCPS extended year schools has been included in this report. Data timeframe August 14, 2017- July 13, 2018. Total of 190 school days.

In addition, data from 2 Opportunity schools on a trimester schedule were also included. Students had a total of 190 school days.

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# ISA Definitions and Considerations

## In-seat Attendance (ISA)

- A measure of daily attendance that can be applied to an individual student or a group. The formula for ISA is: 
$$\frac{[(\text{SUM (membership days of each student)}) \text{ MINUS } (\text{SUM (absences by those students)})]}{\text{SUM (membership days of each student)}}$$

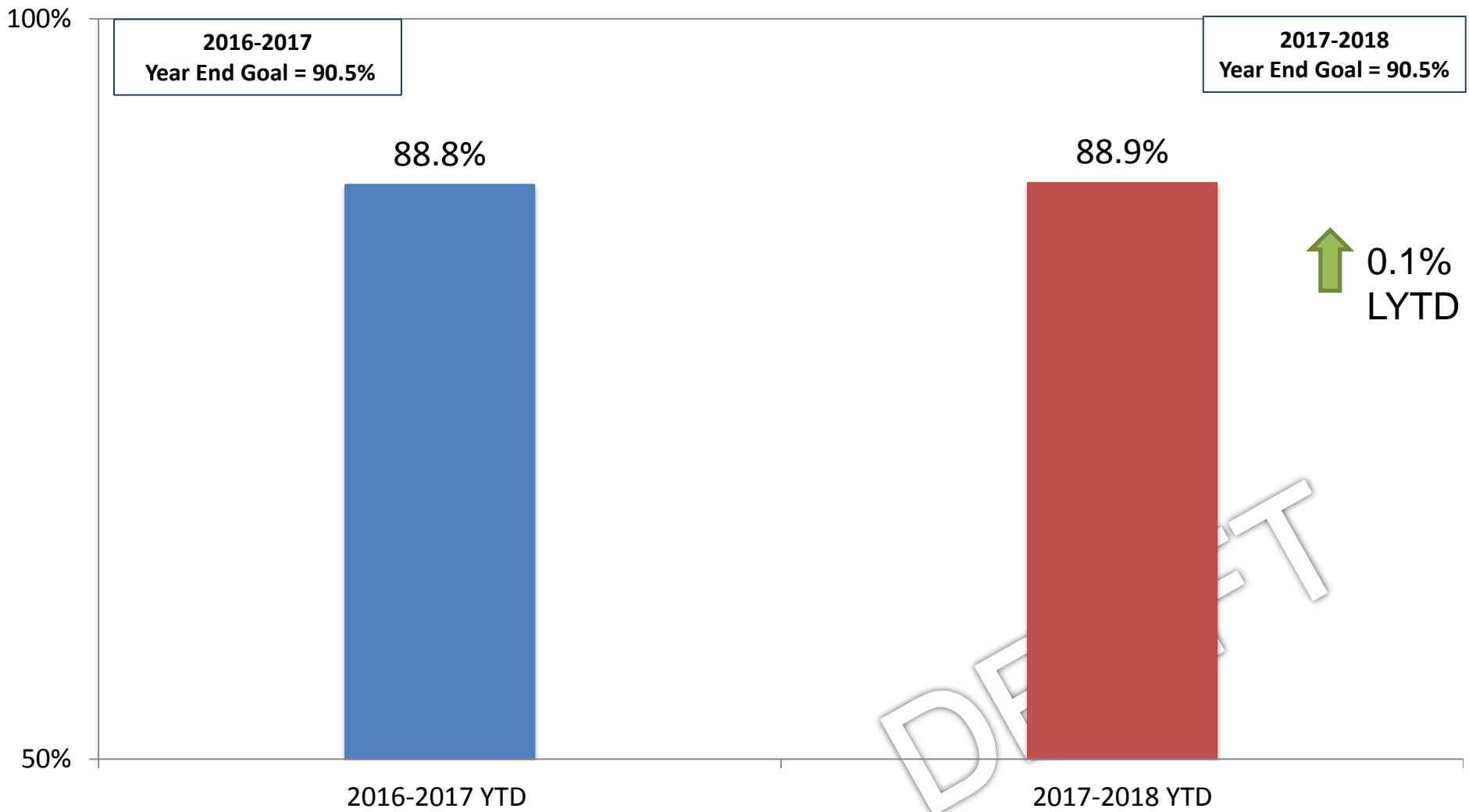
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# In-Seat Attendance (ISA) Highlights

- DCPS' 2017-2018 (YTD) ISA rates are 88.9% (1% below their goal of 90.5%) and 0.1% higher than 2016-2017 (YTD) rates.
- Public Charter School sector's 2017-2018 (YTD) ISA rates are 91.7% (0.6% below their goal of 92.3%) and 0.2% lower than 2016-2017 (YTD) rates.

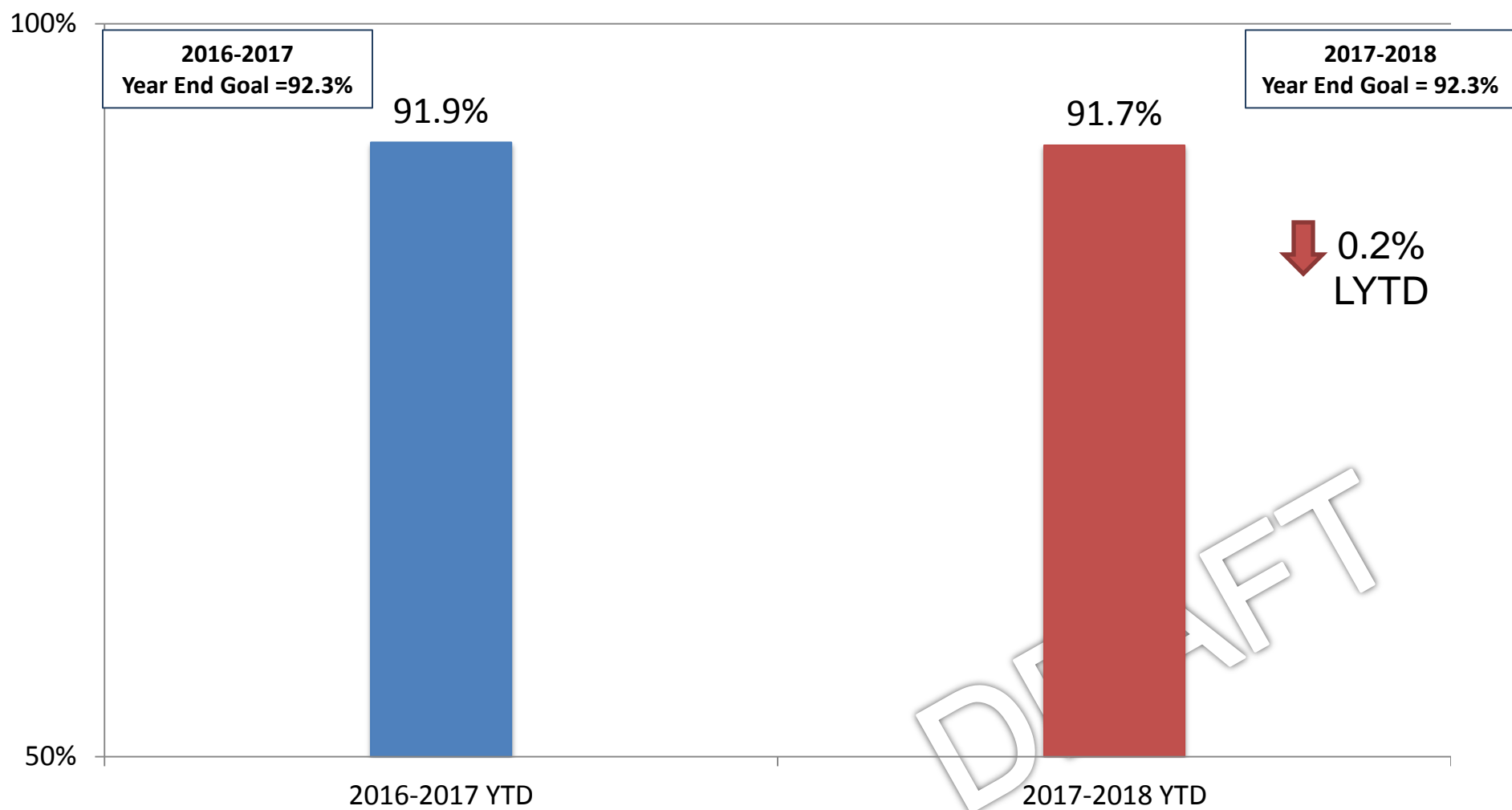
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# In-Seat Attendance – DCPS

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# Chronic Truancy

## Methodology Transition and Definition

- In 2016, the Truancy Taskforce identified that this calculation was being implemented using different business rules across sectors.
- Specifically, not all students ever truant during the school year were included in the numerator (some students leaving the school were missing) in some cases; and some students ineligible to be truant (not of compulsory age) were included in the denominator in some cases.
- The Truancy Taskforce agreed upon a uniform chronic truancy rate methodology, and Council committed the methodological clarification in legislation.
- The uniform chronic truancy rate is now defined as: “The incidence of students of compulsory attendance age, as defined by D.C. Official Code § 38-202(a), enrolled at a school at any point in a given school year who are absent without valid excuse, as defined by 5-A DCMR § 2102.2, on ten (10) or more occasions within a single school year, divided by the total number of students of compulsory attendance age ever enrolled during the corresponding school year.”

# Chronic Truancy DCPS

- The SY 2017-2018 chronic truancy rate for DCPS is 2.1% higher than the SY 2016-2017 rate.

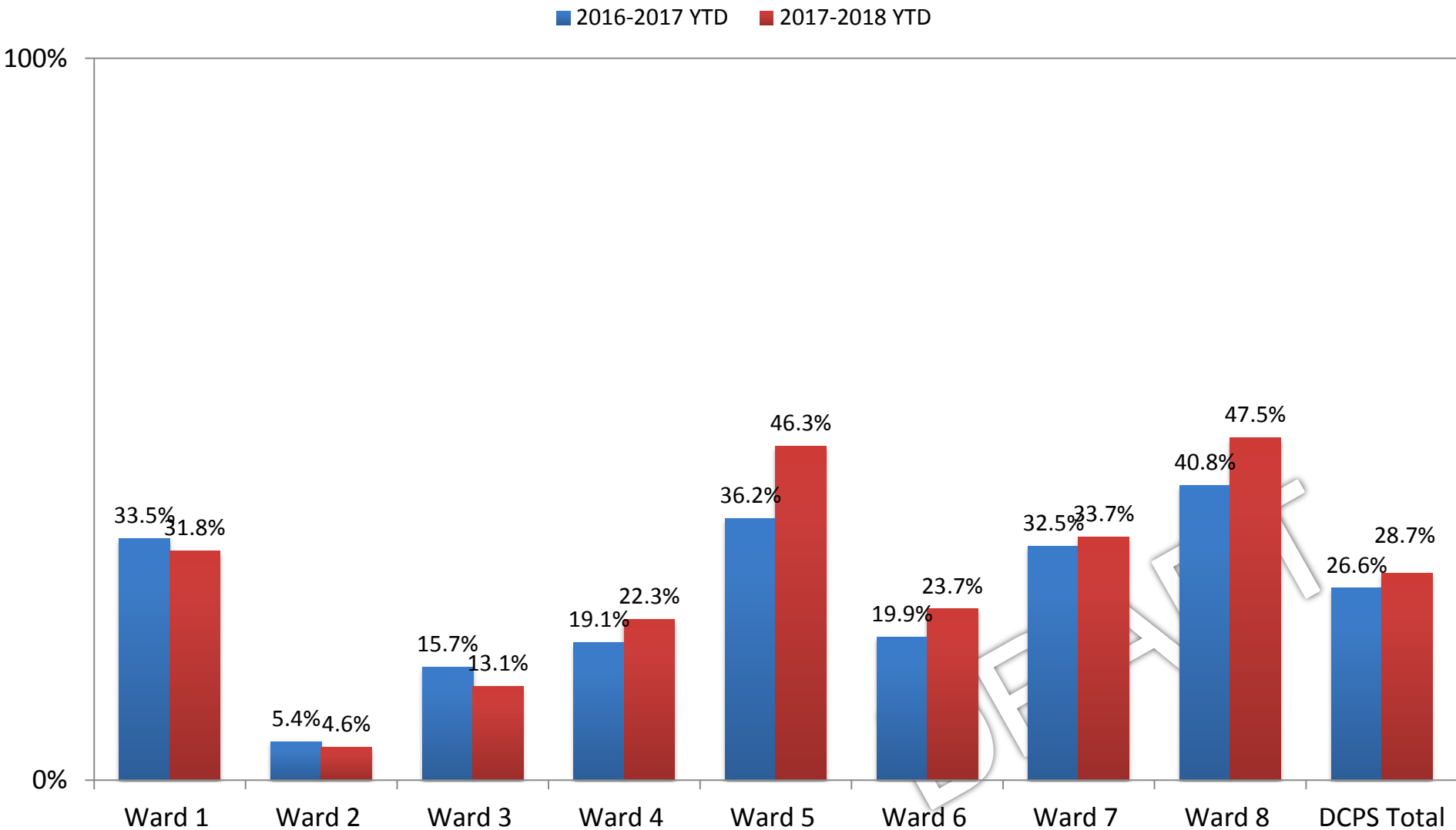

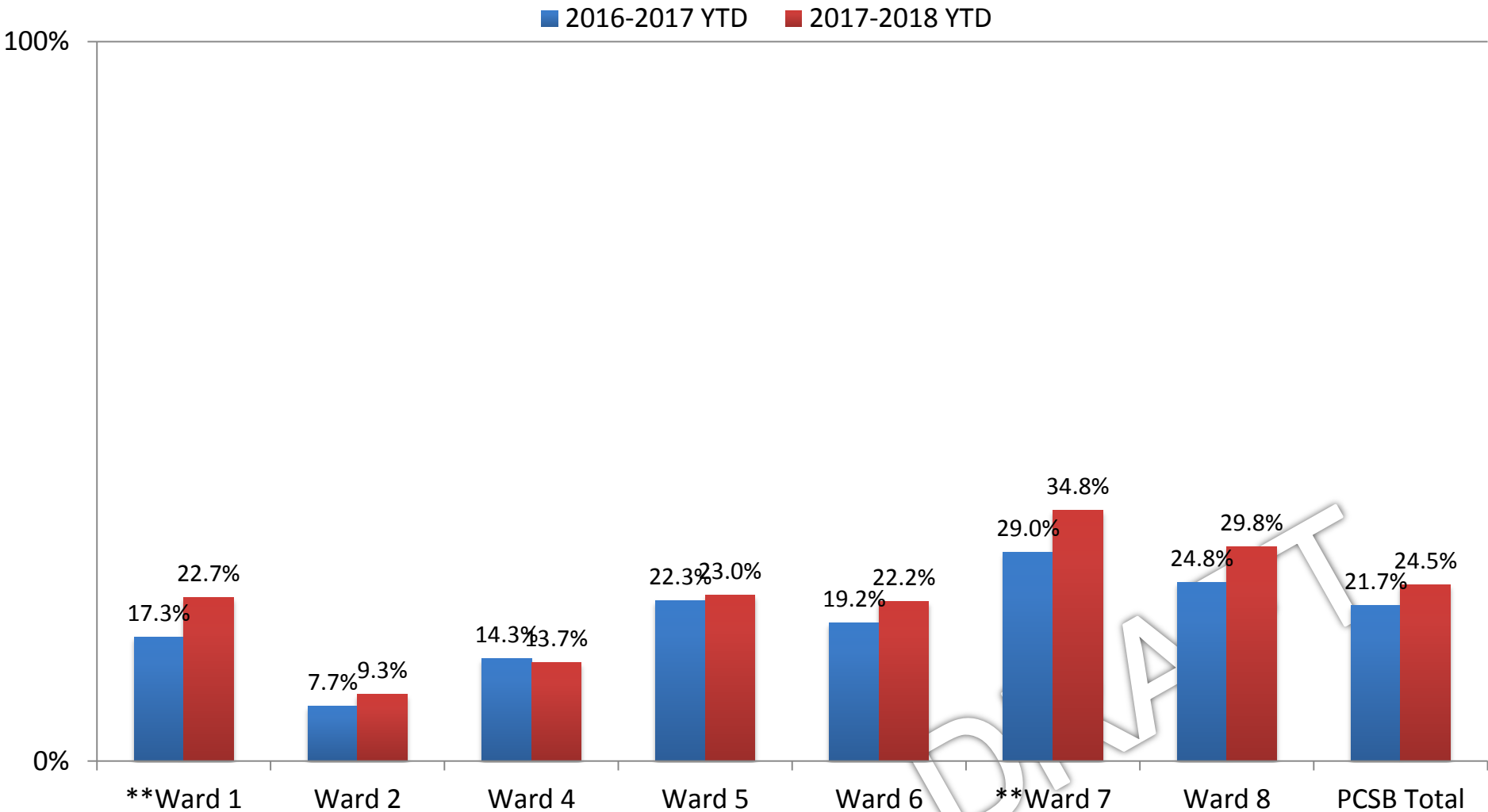

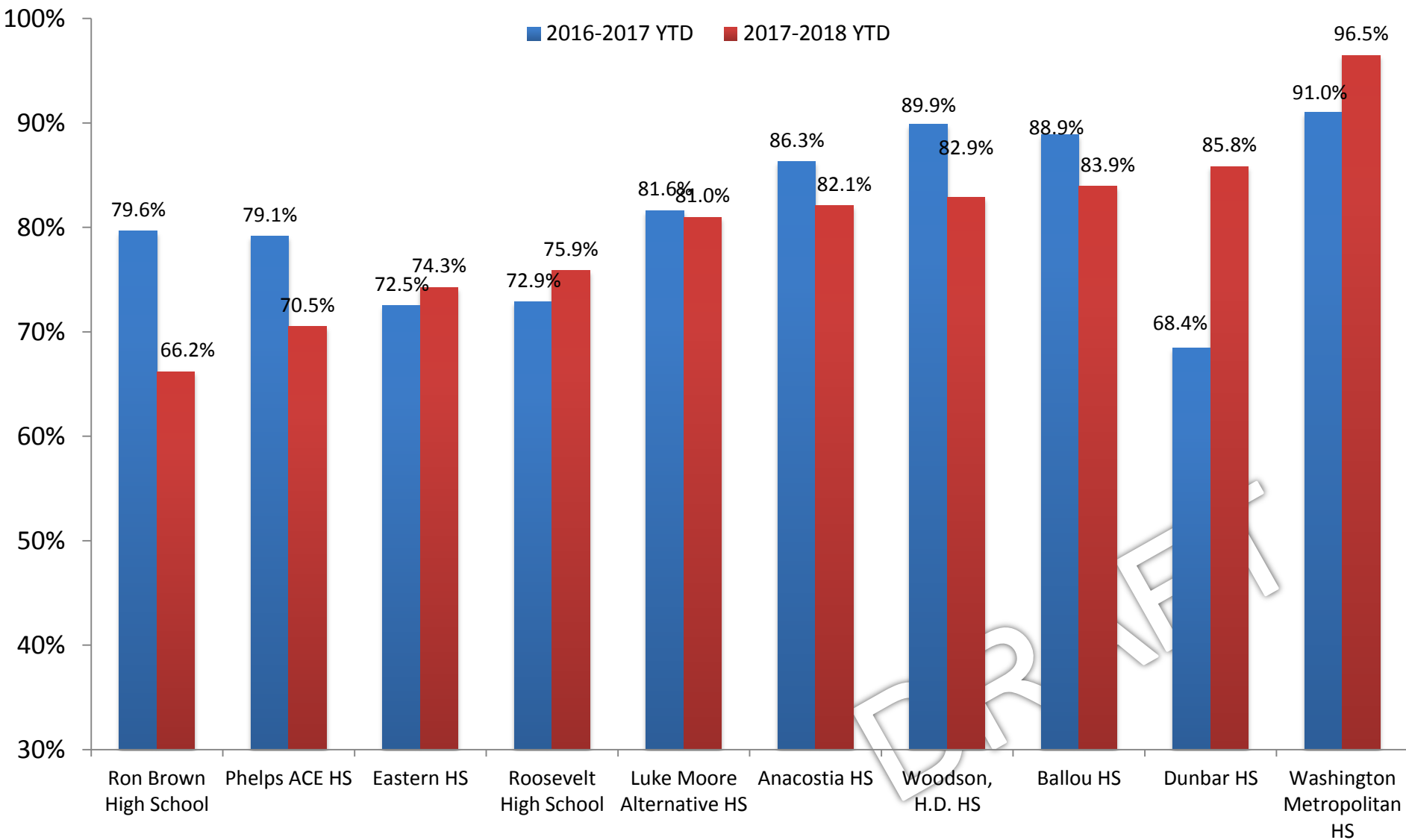

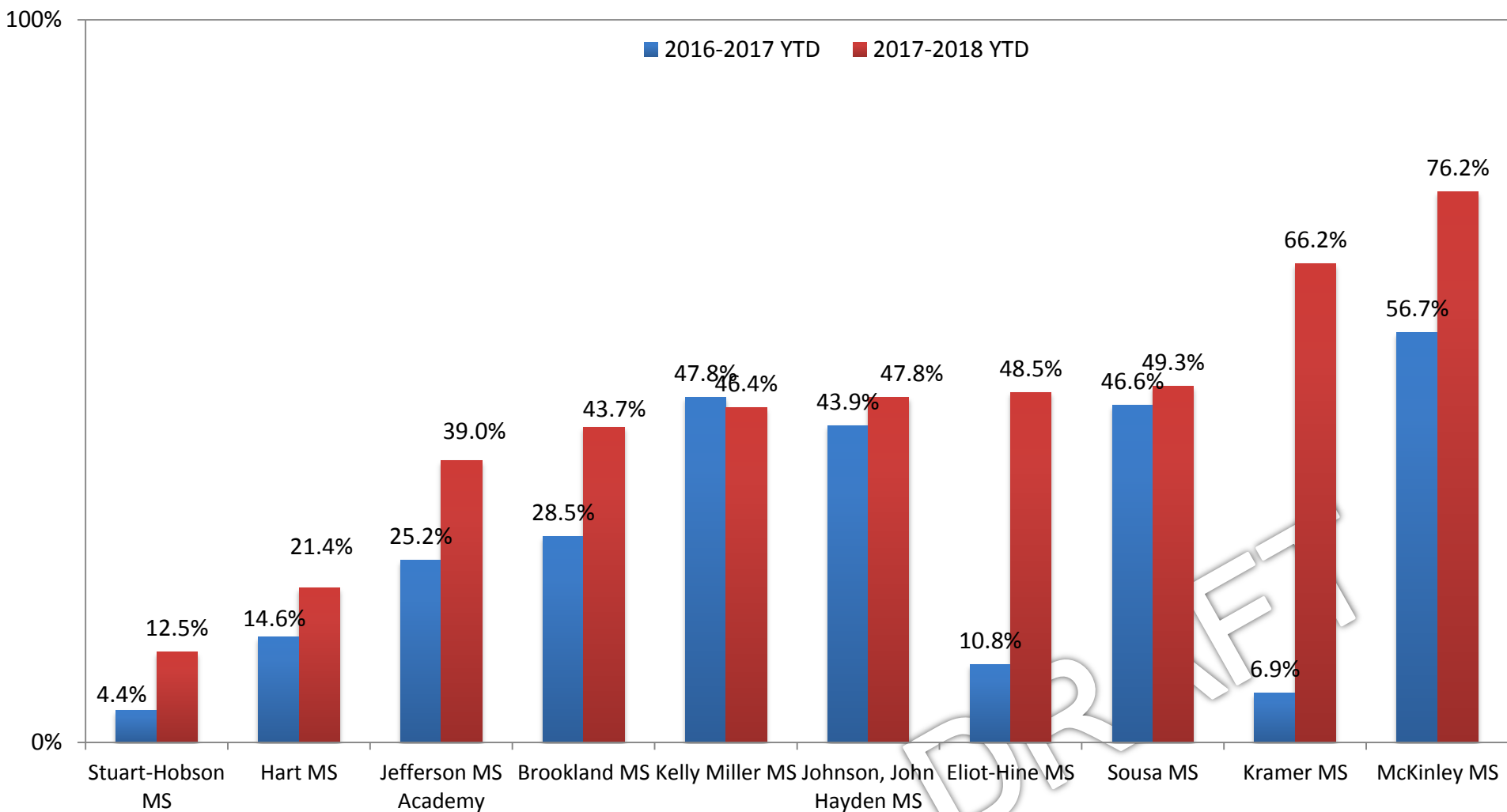

# Chronic Truancy by School – Top 10 DCPS High Schools with Highest Rates





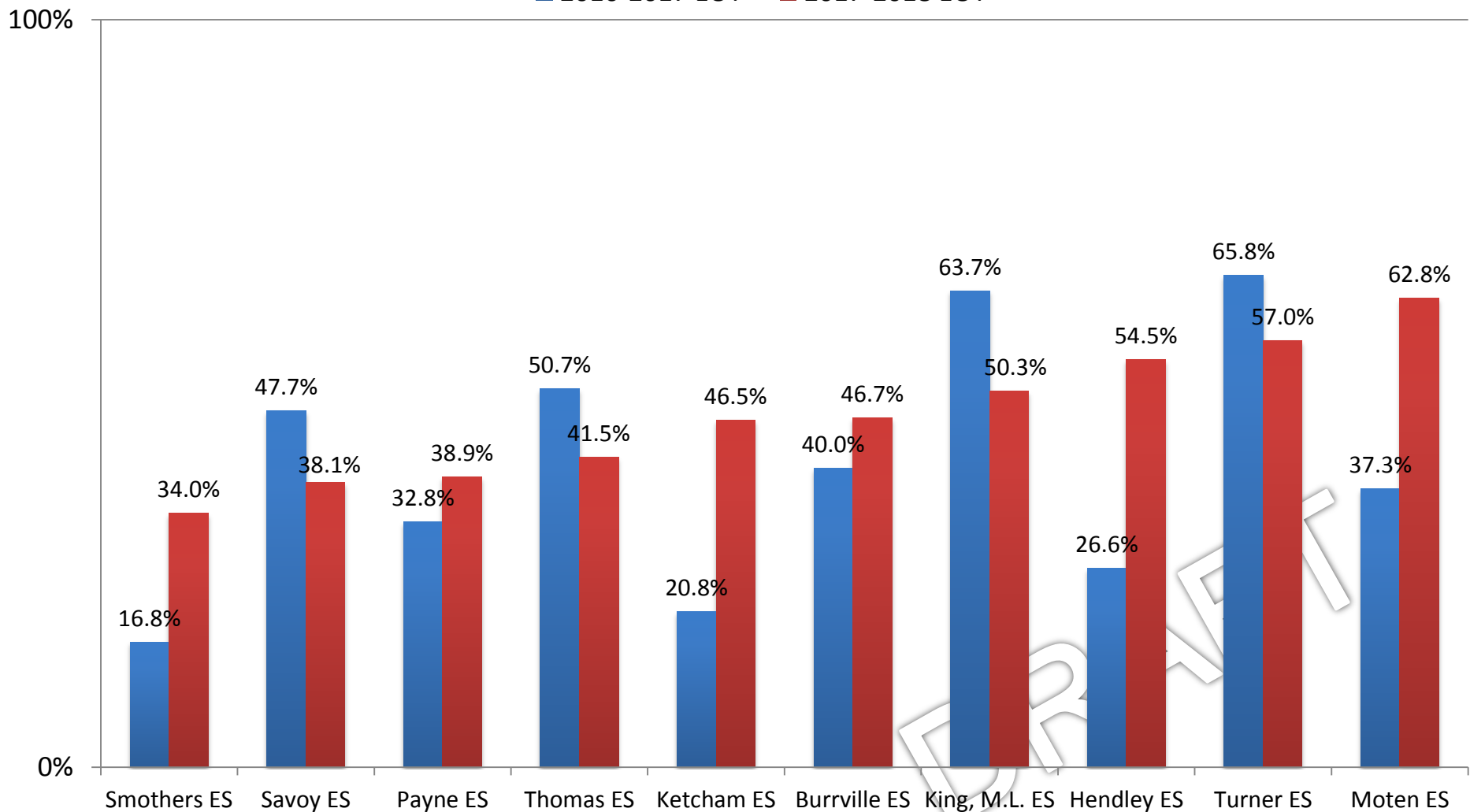
# Chronic Truancy by School – Top 10 DCPS Middle Schools with Highest Rates

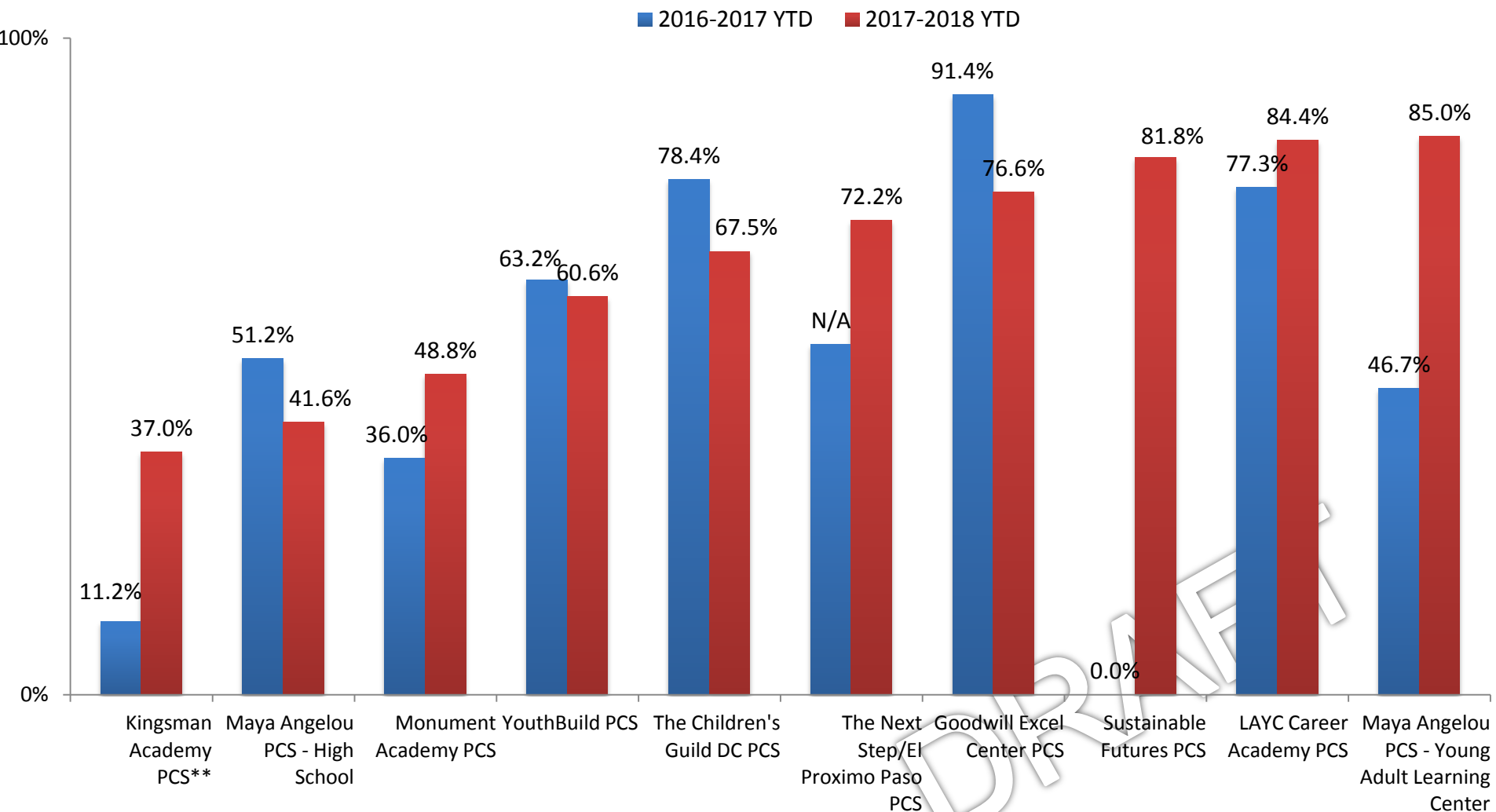
# Chronic Truancy by School – Top 10 DCPS Elementary Schools with Highest Rates

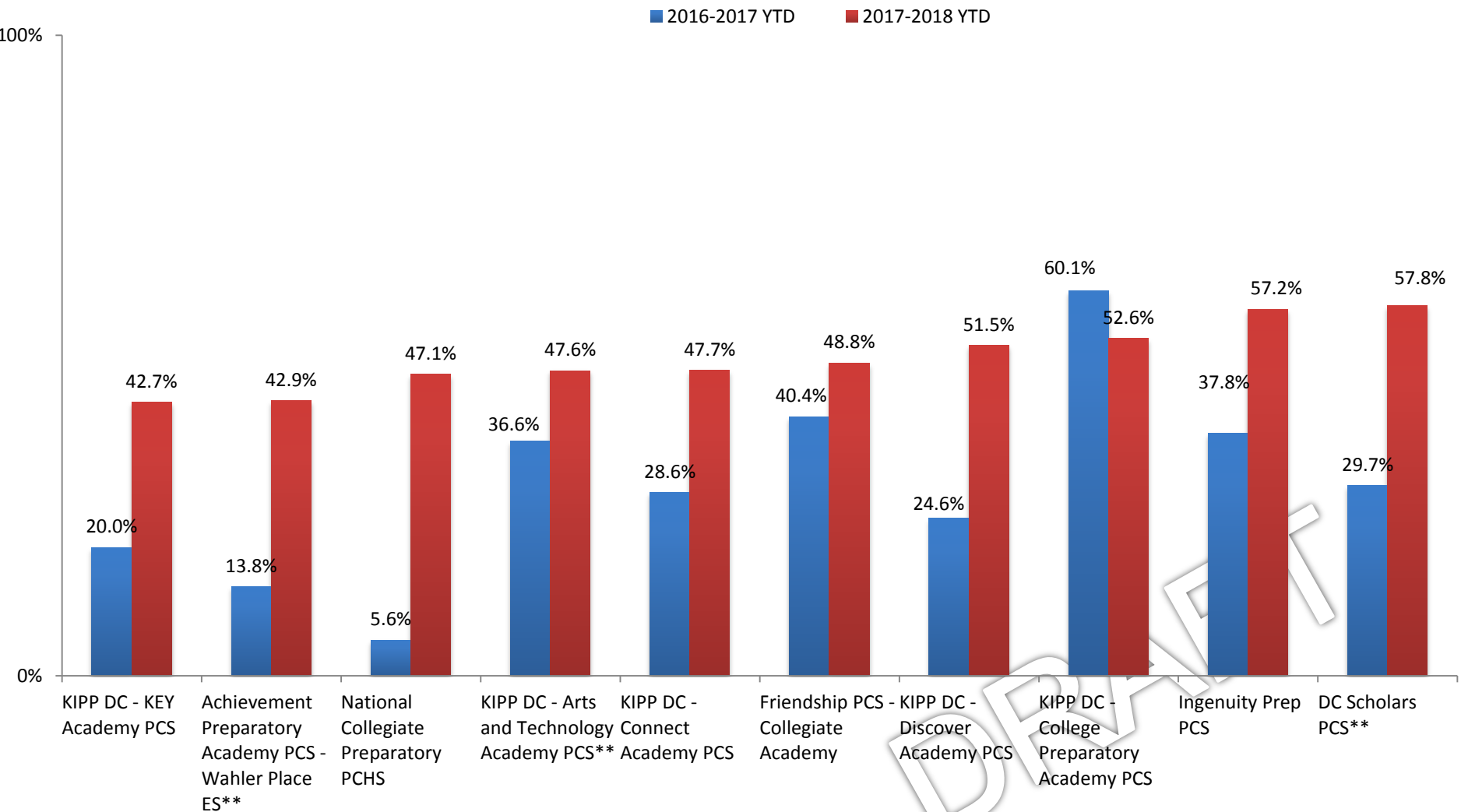

# Chronic Truancy by School – Top 10 Adult or Alternative PCSs with Highest Rates



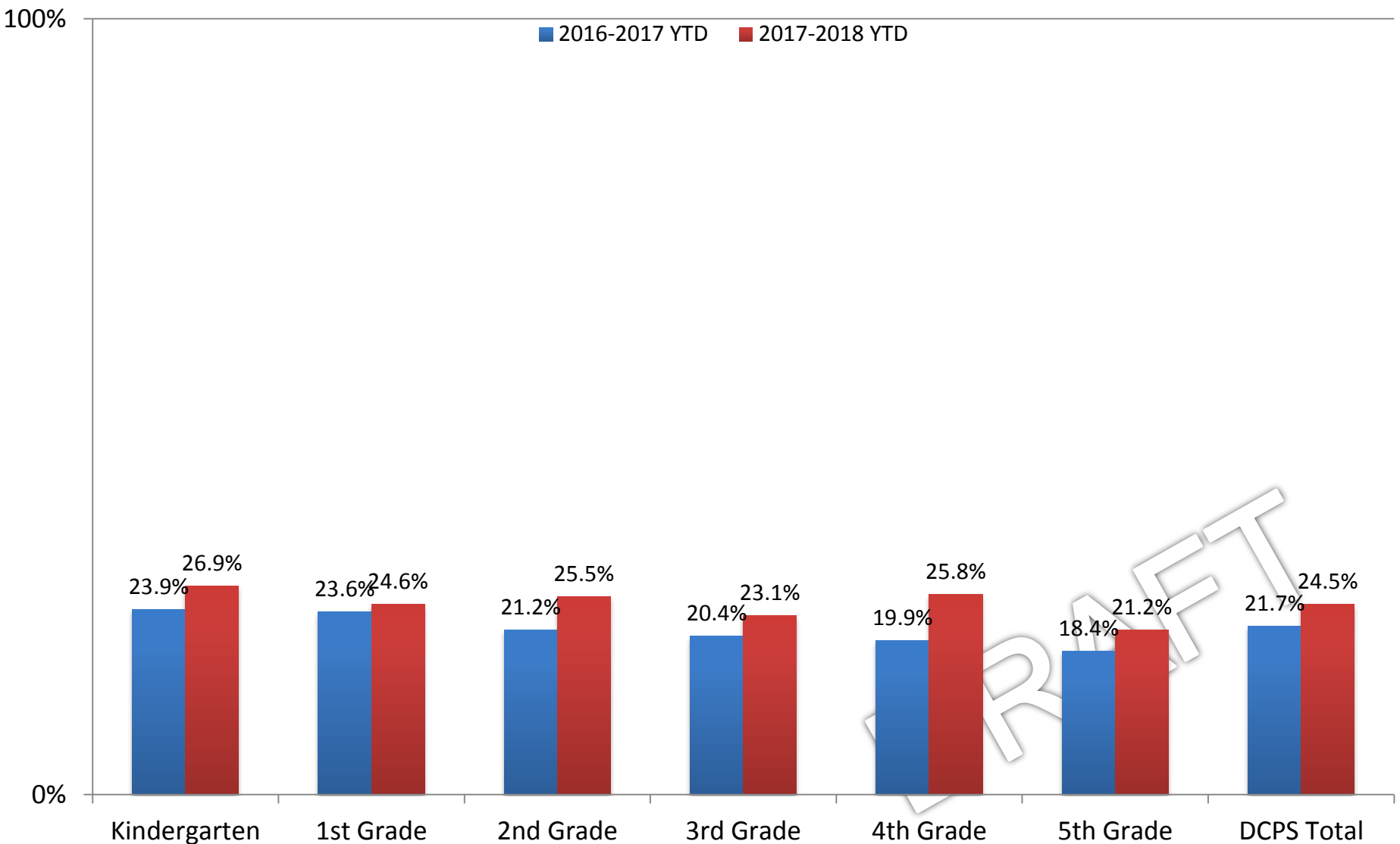

# Chronic Truancy by School – Top 10 PCSs with Highest Rates

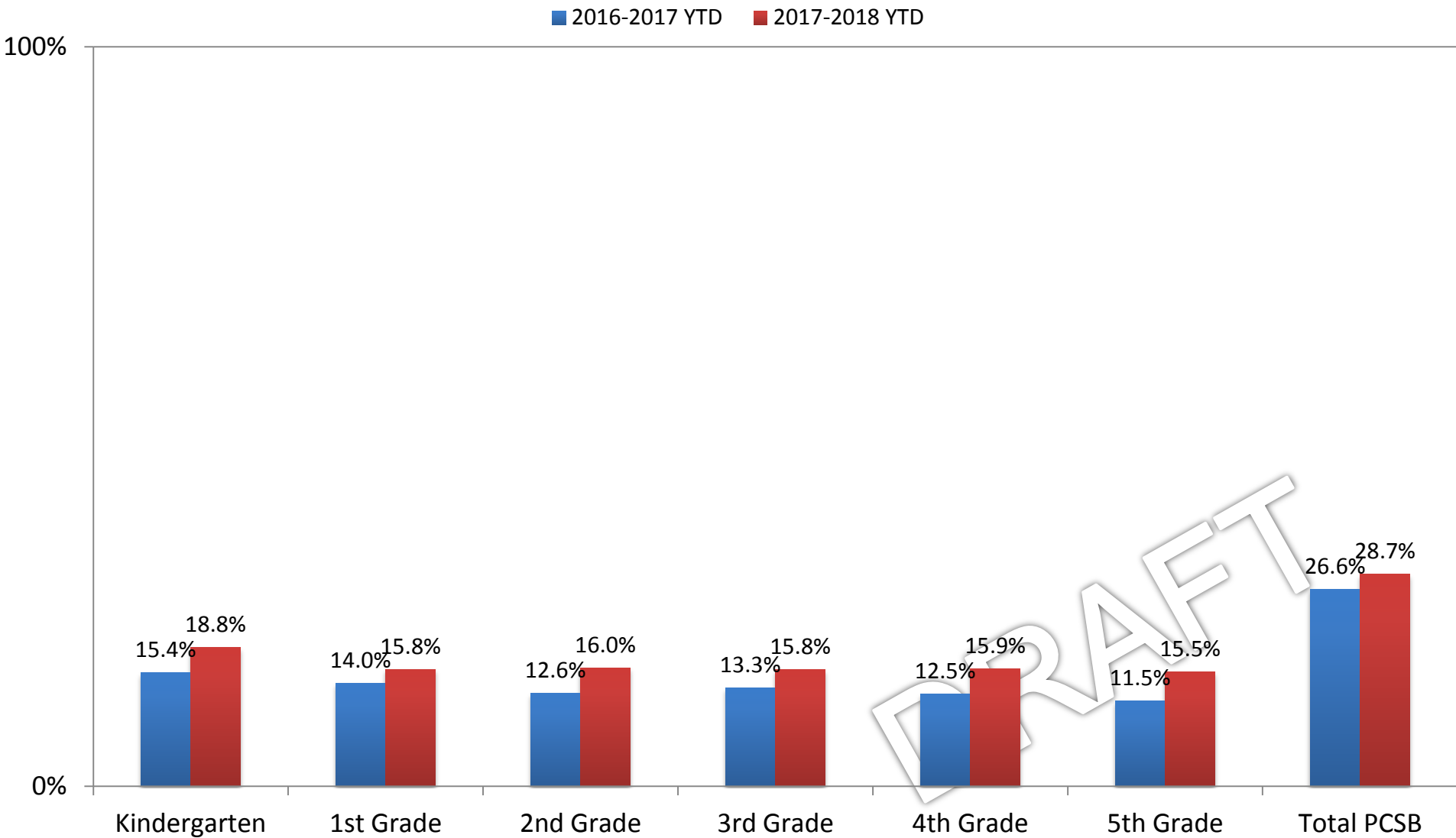

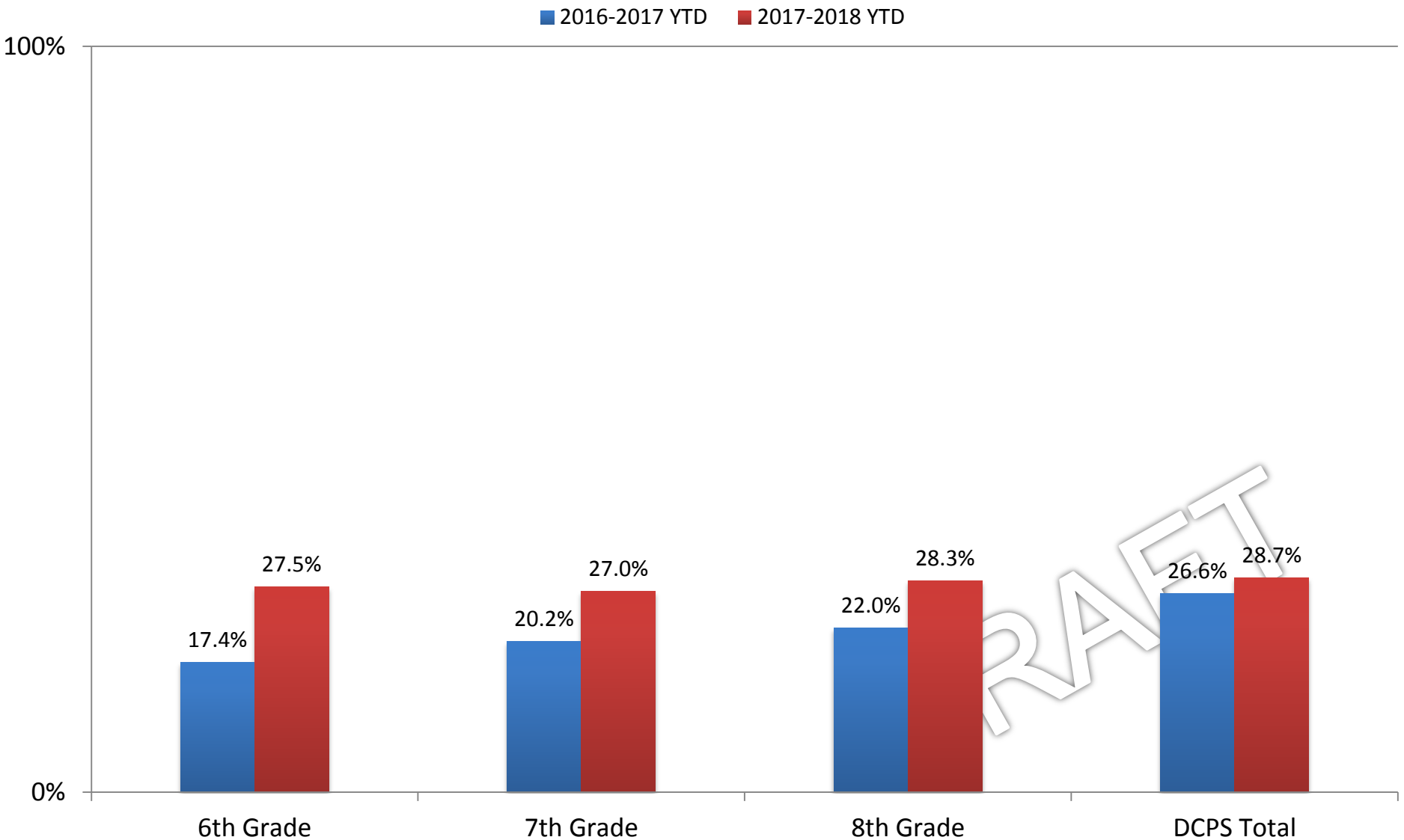

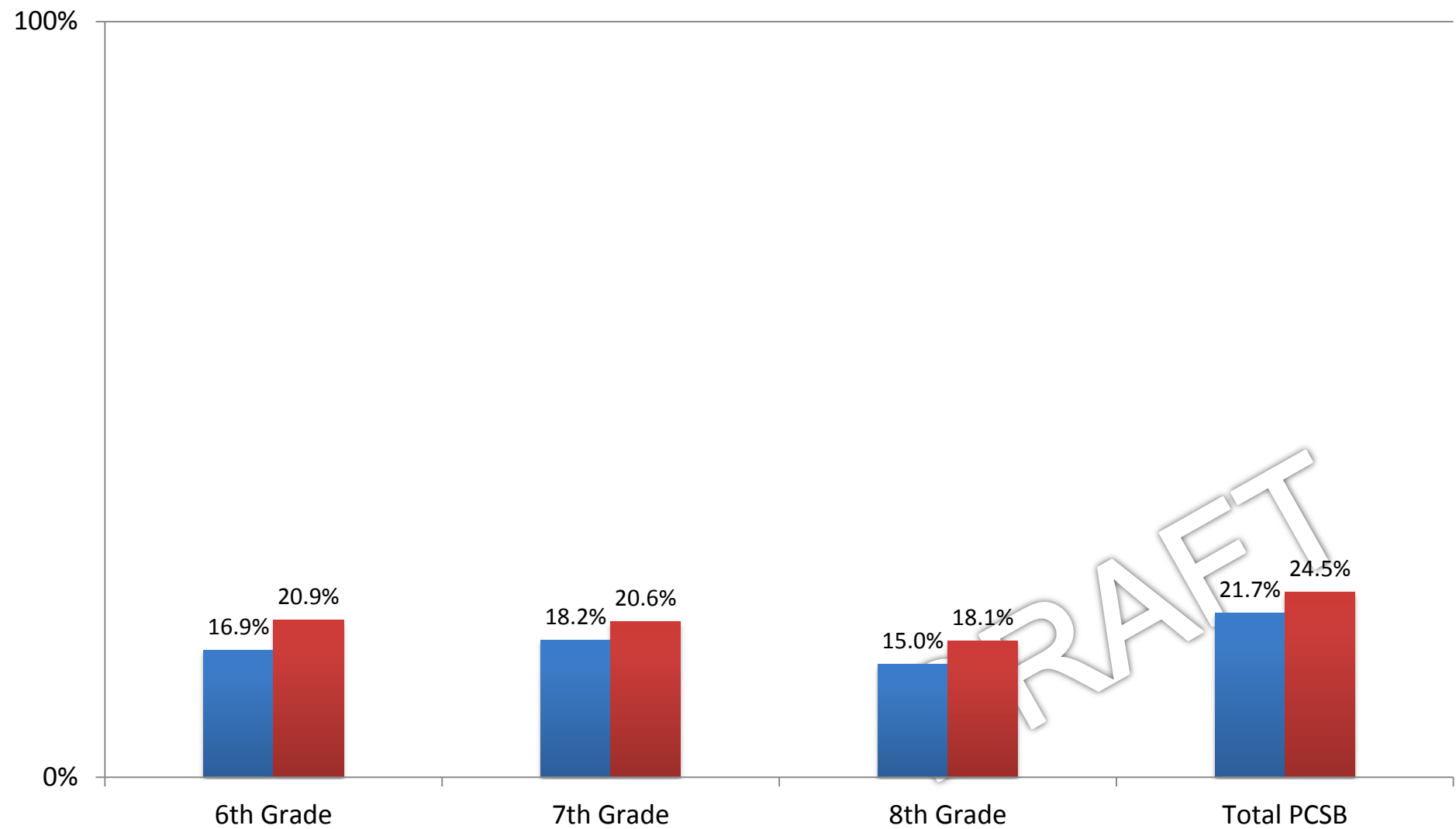


# Chronic Truancy by Grade (6-8) – DCPS



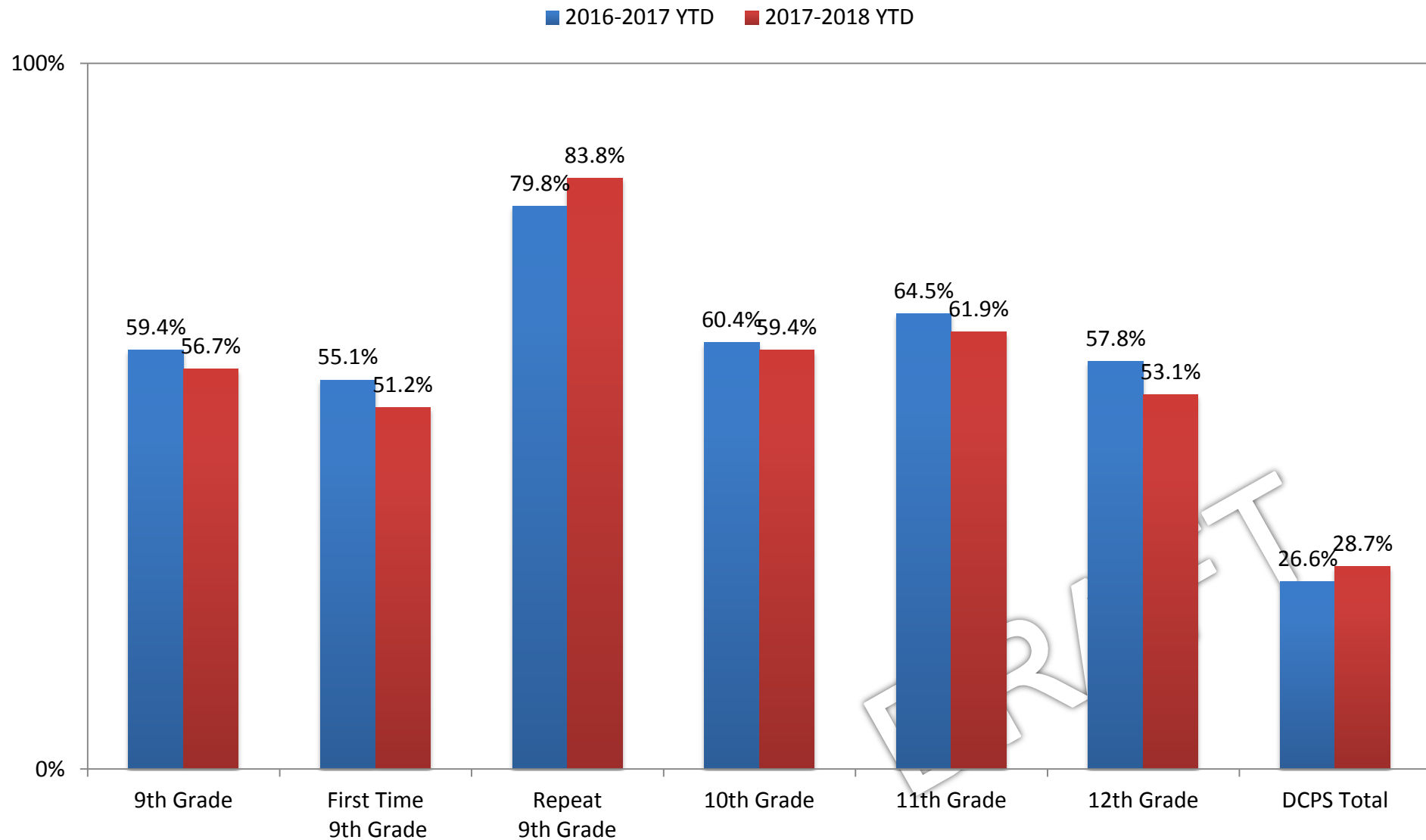

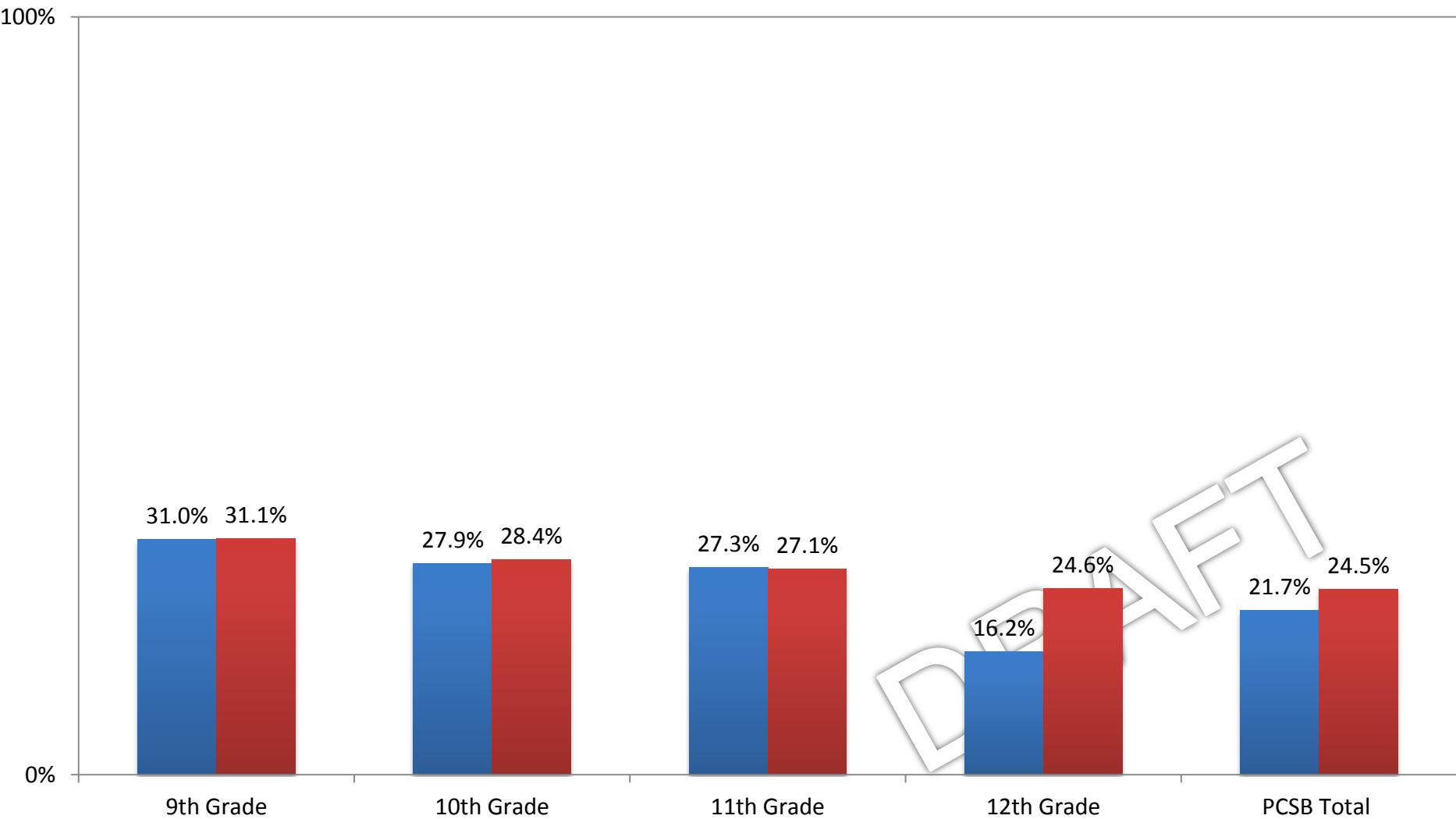

# Chronic Truancy – Highlights

## Truancy by Ward

- Students attending DCPS schools in Ward 8 have the highest chronic truancy rates (47.5%) among DCPS. Students in Ward 5 had the highest increase in truancy rates with a 10.1% increase.
- Compared to last year, DCPS had lower truancy rates for Wards 2,3, and 1; and higher truancy rates for Wards 4,6,7, and 8. Truancy rates for DCPS students in Ward 3 decreased 2.6%.
- Students attending PCS in Ward 7 have the highest chronic truancy rates (34.8%) among PCS schools. Ward 7 had the highest increase in truancy rates with a 5.8% increase.
- With the exception of Ward 4, PCSB experienced an increase in truancy throughout the District in comparison to the previous school. PCS students in Ward 4 saw the highest improvement in truancy rates (0.6% decrease).
  - Ward 1 and Ward 7 each have one new Charter campus.

# Chronic Truancy – Highlights Cont.

## Truancy by Grade

- DCPS students in the 11<sup>th</sup> grade have the highest truancy rates. Currently 61.9% of 11<sup>th</sup> graders are truant.
  - The truancy rate for DCPS 9th grade repeaters is 83.8% (33% higher) than first time 9th graders (51.2%). Currently, this data point is not captured by the Public Charter School sector.
- Compared to last year, DCPS has achieved the most significant reduction in truancy rates for 12<sup>th</sup> grade students (53.1% vs 57.8%)
- PCS students in 9<sup>th</sup> grade have the highest truancy rate with a 31.1% truancy rate.
- Except for 11<sup>th</sup> grade, truancy rates have increased for each grade. Students in 12<sup>th</sup> grade saw the highest increase in truancy rates with a 8.3% increase.

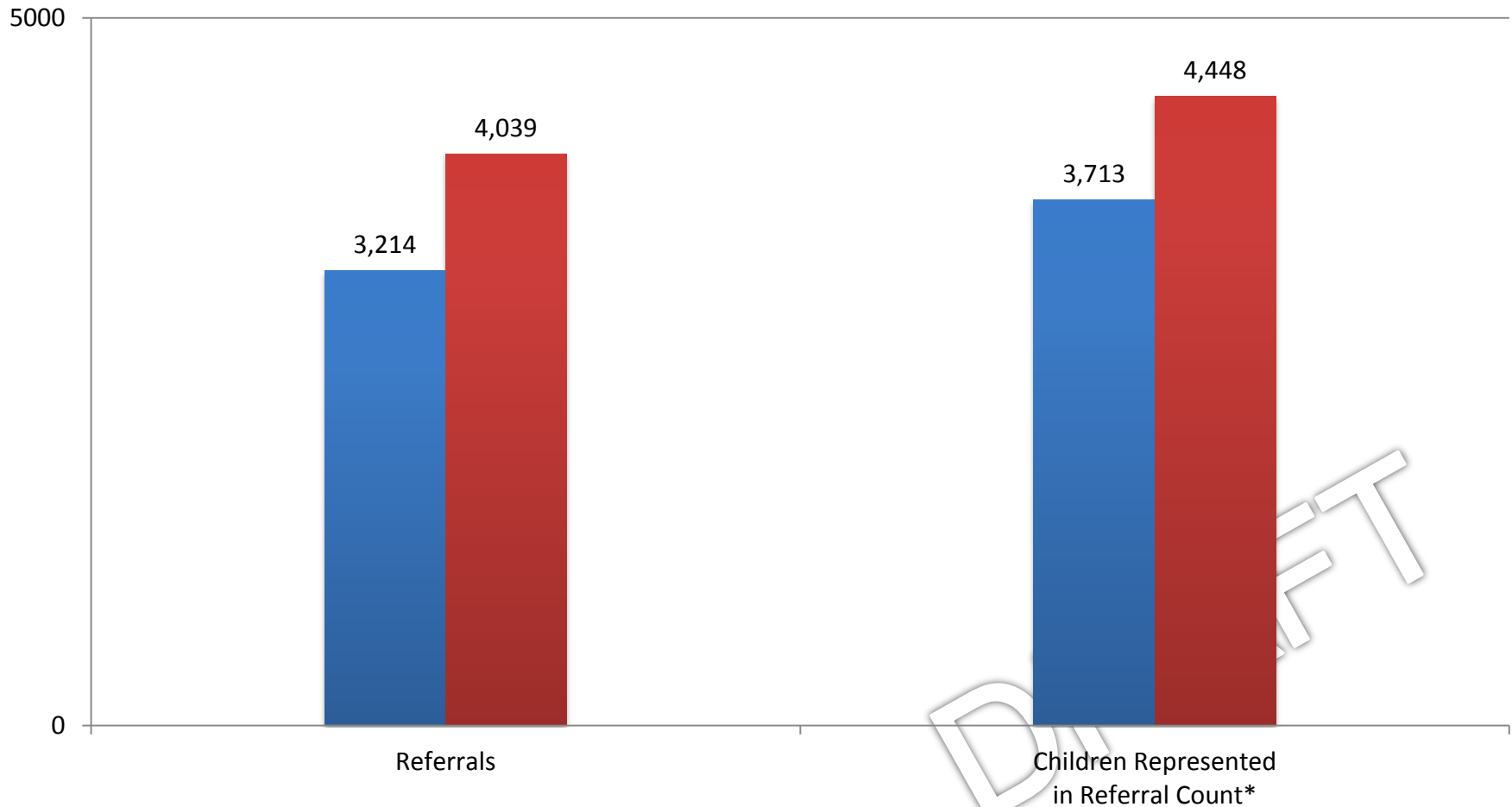

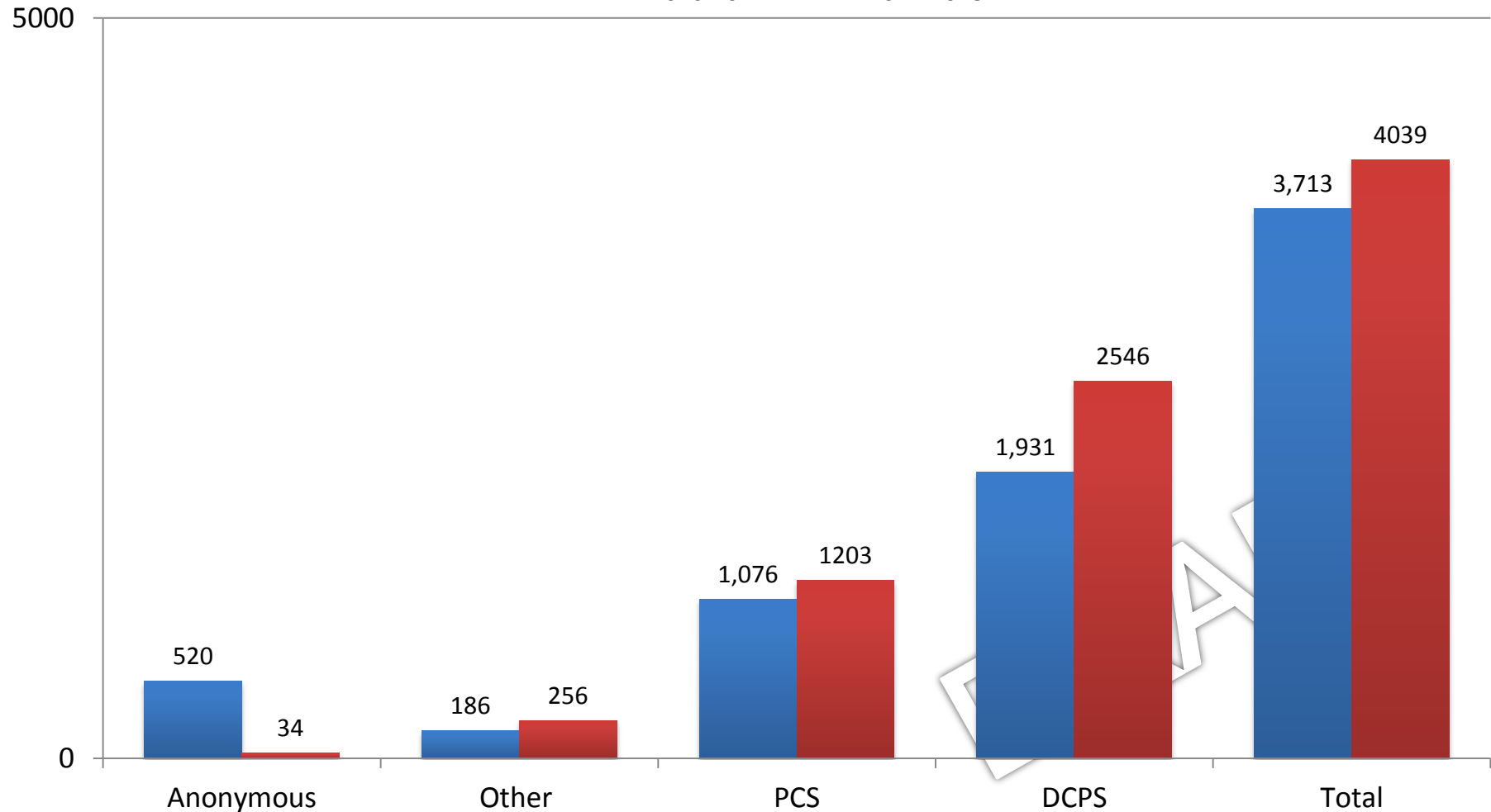

# Referral Source (# of Children)

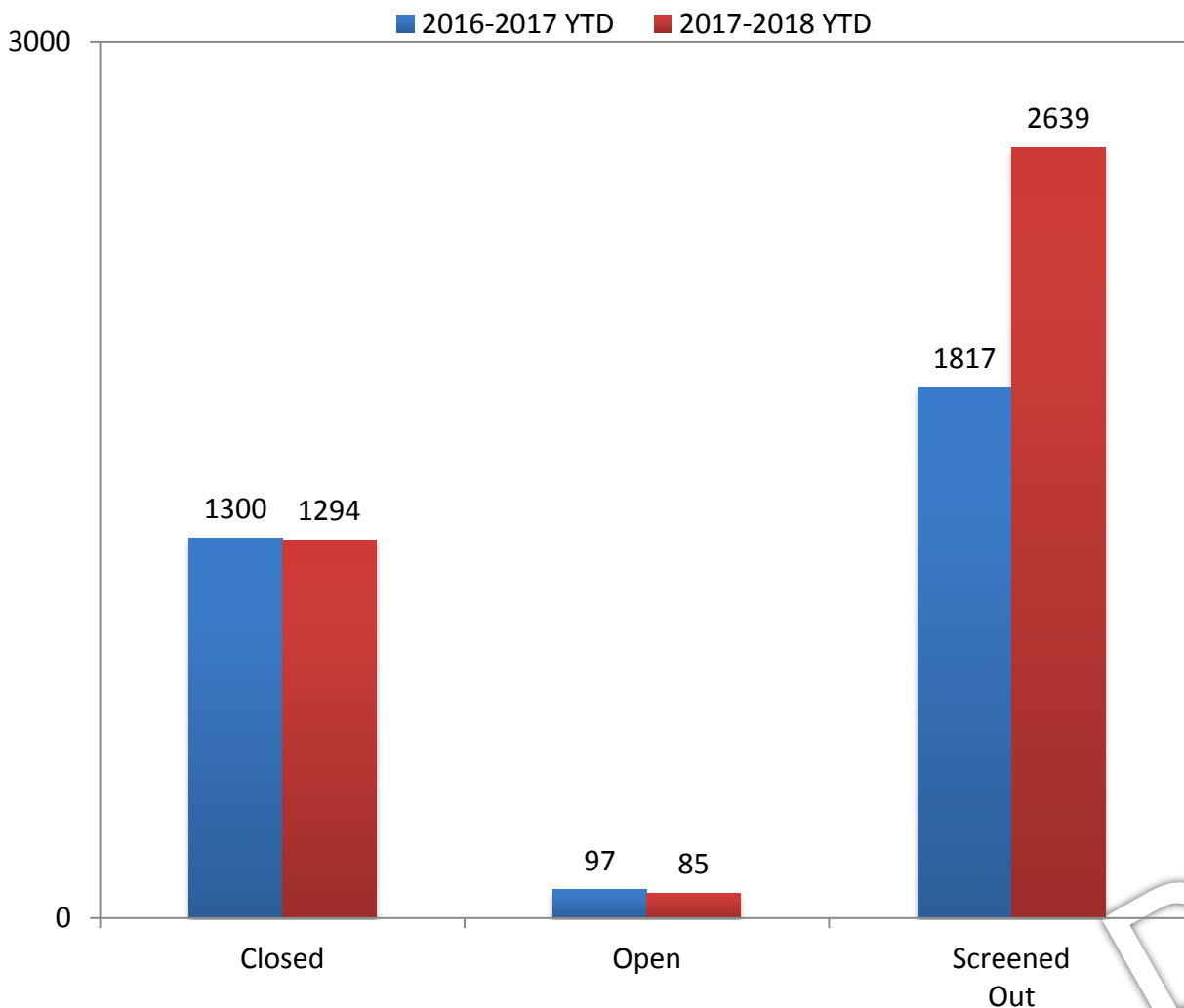

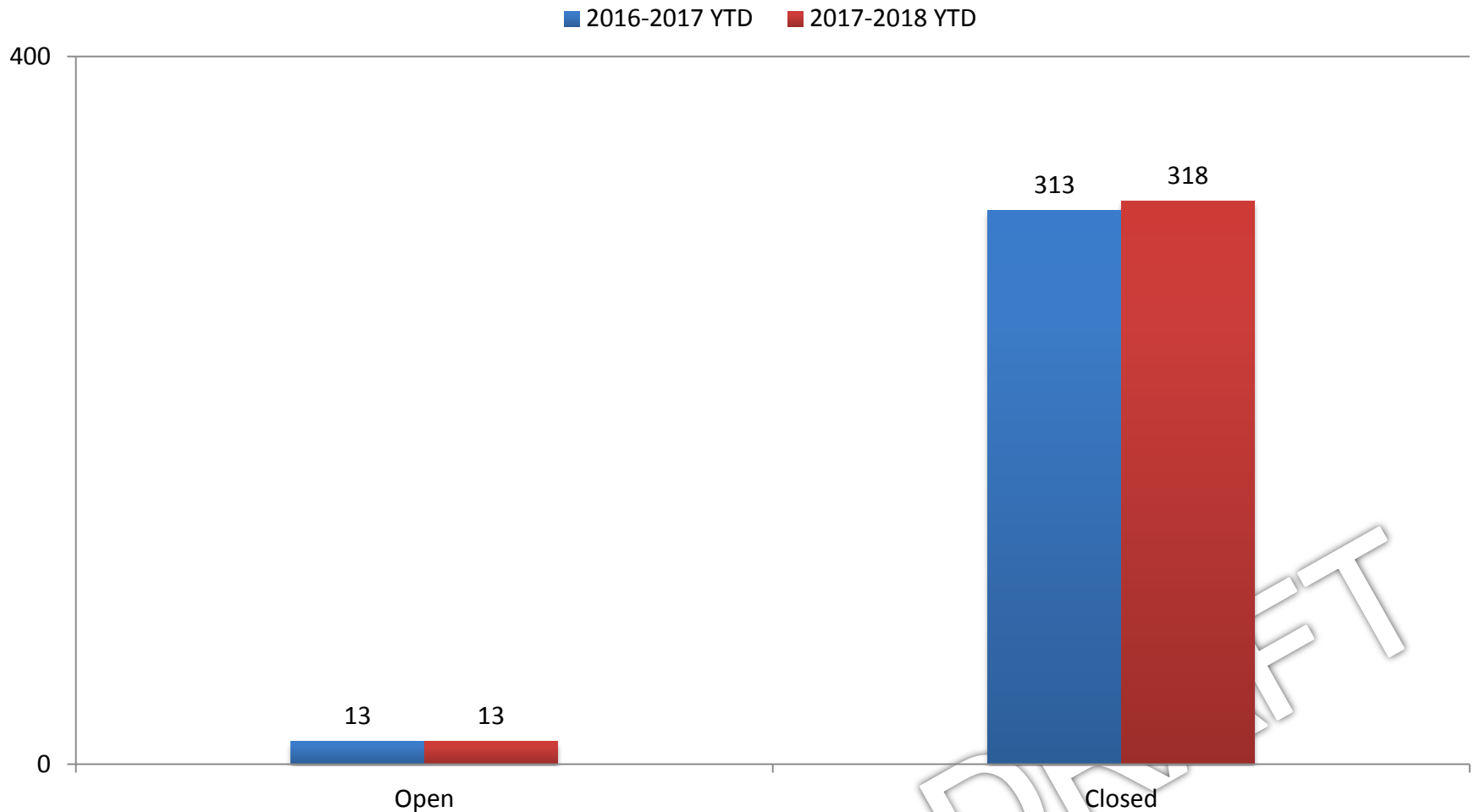


## Definitions

# CPS-I Open vs. Closed By Referral Count

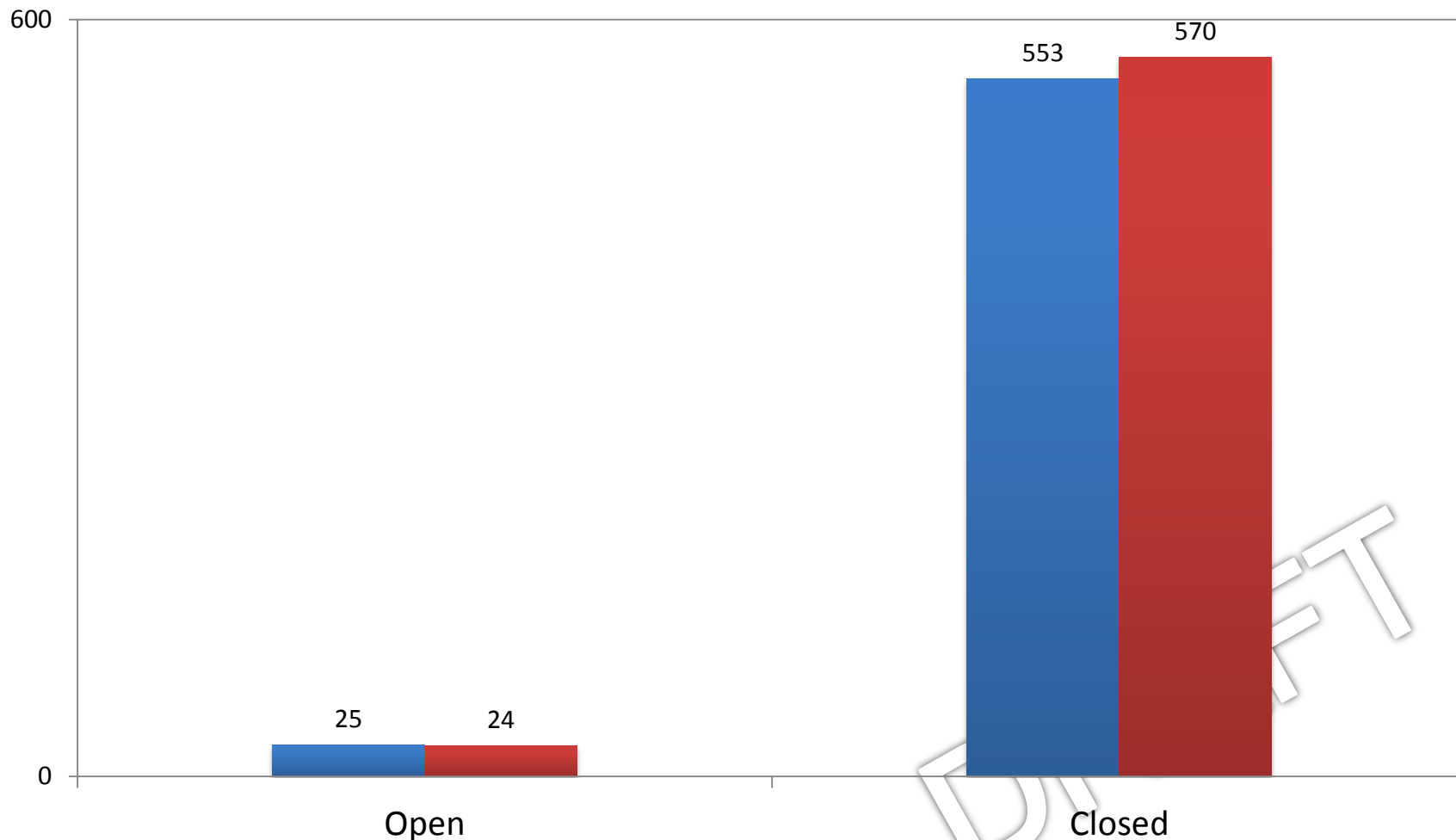

# CPS-I Open vs. Closed by # of Children

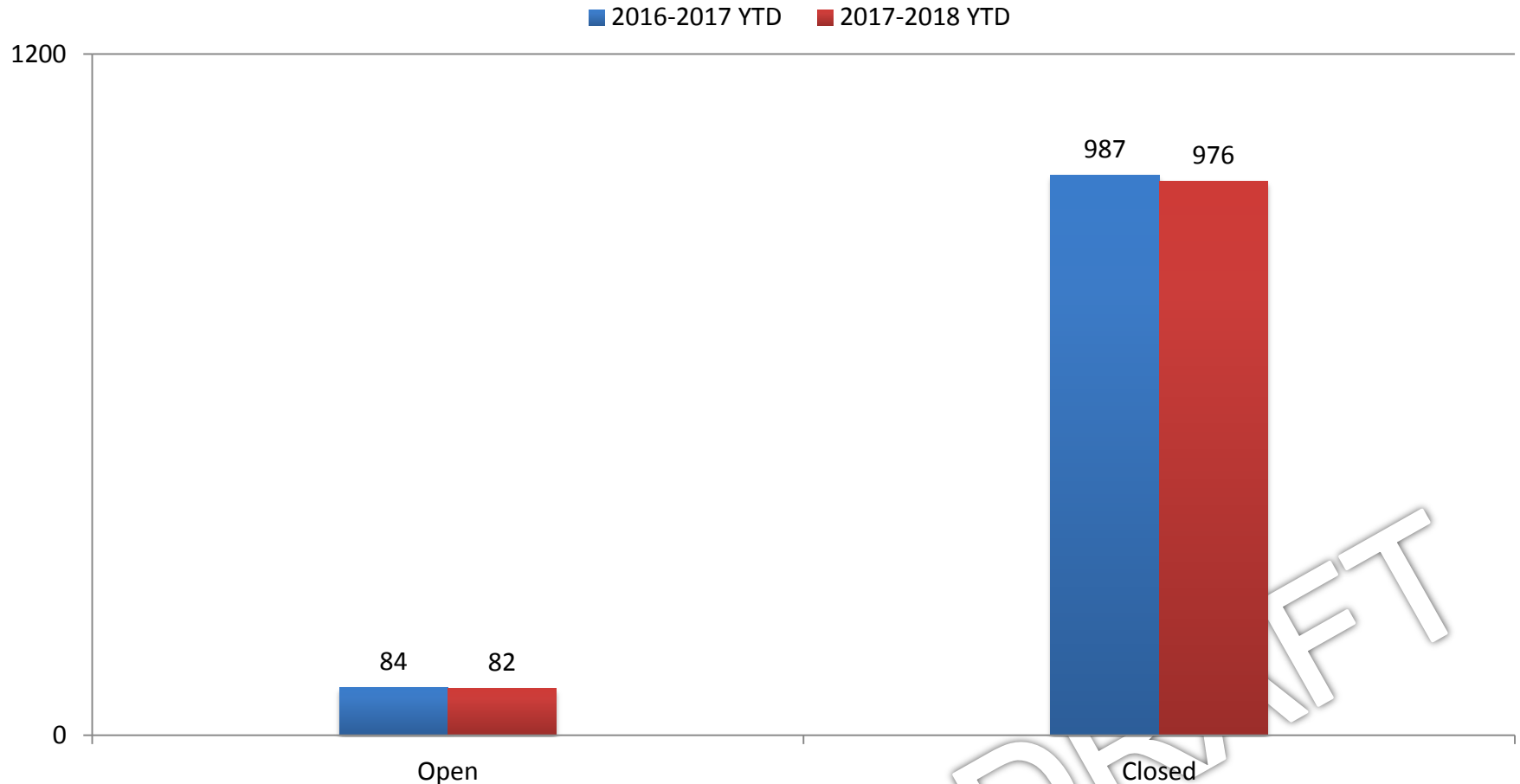

# CPS-FA Open vs. Closed by Referral Count

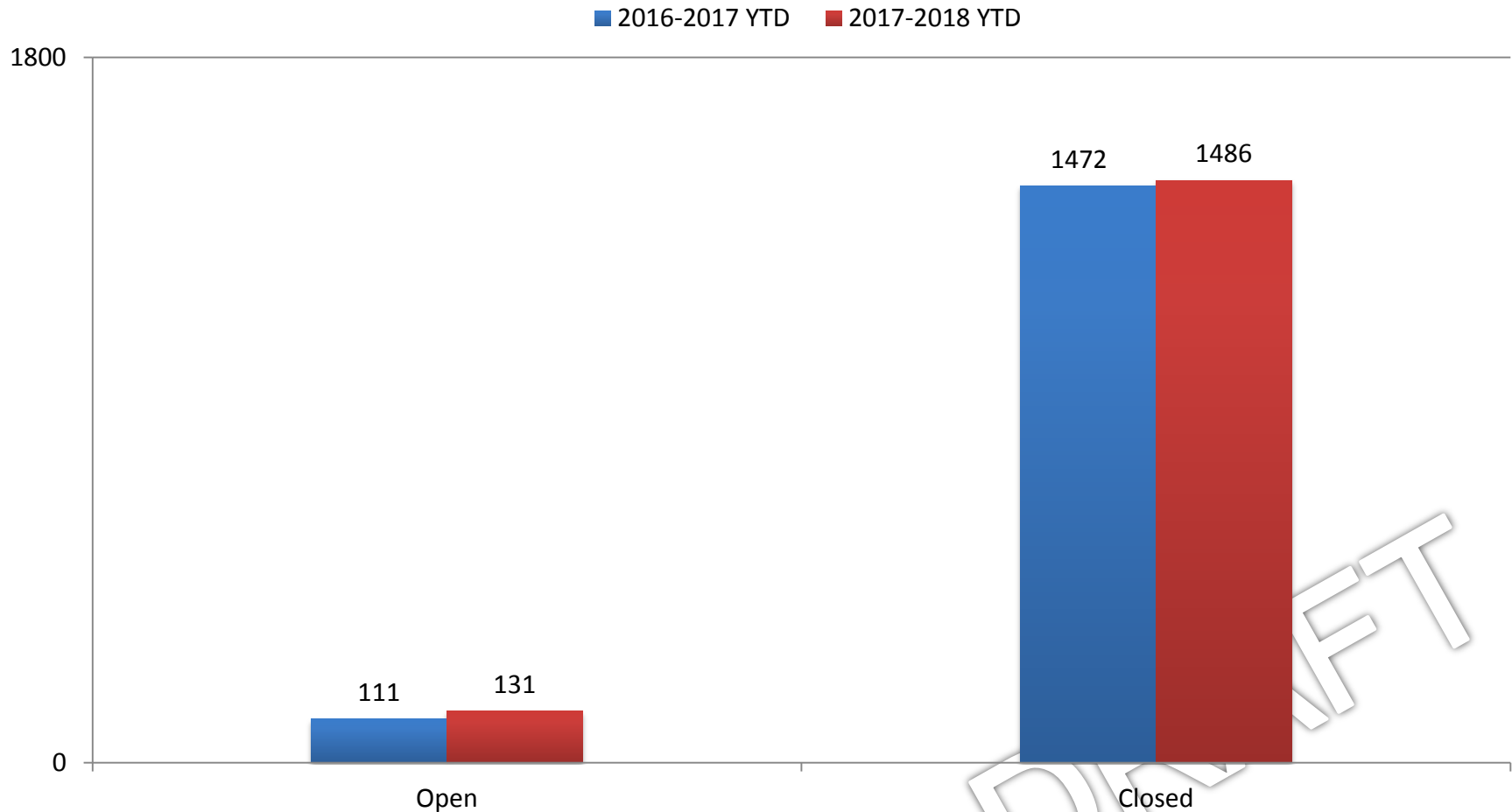

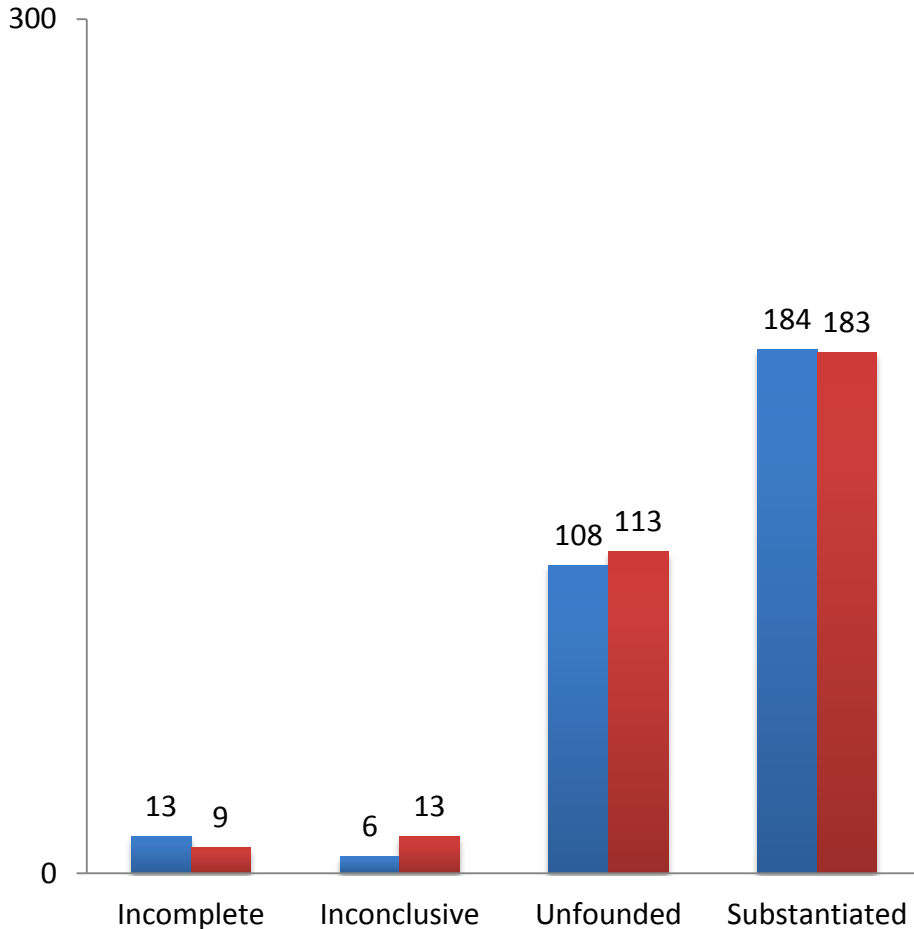

# Disposition of CPS-I Closed Investigations

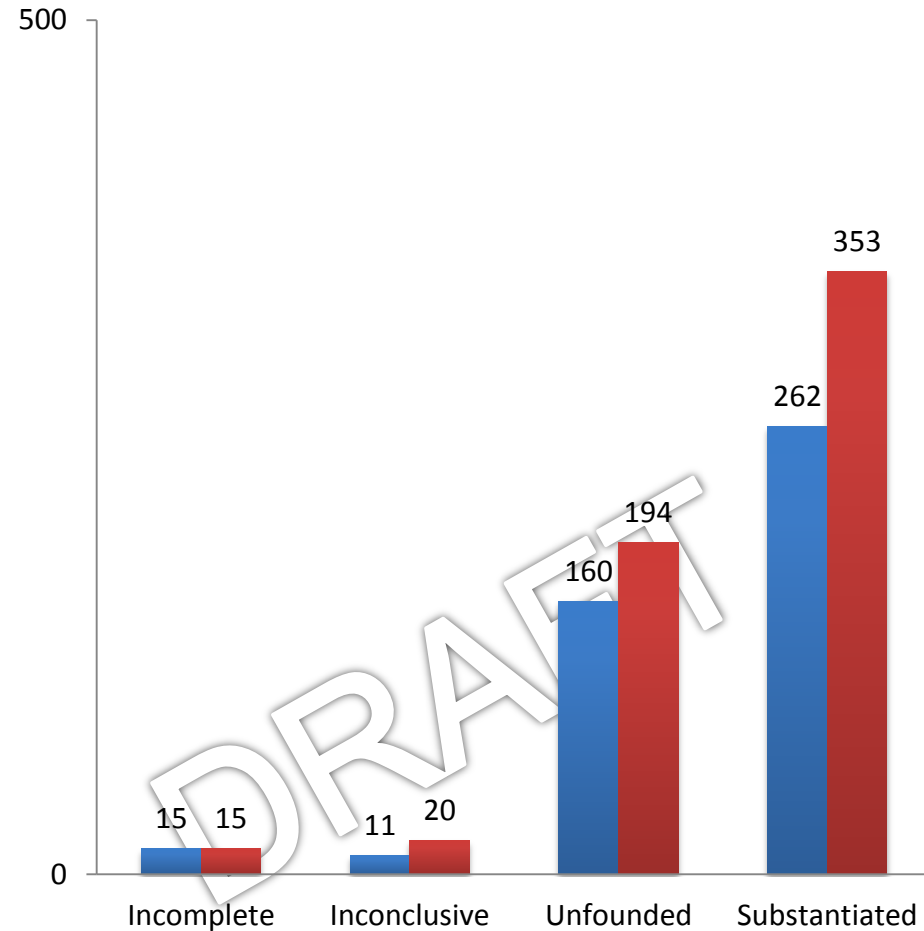

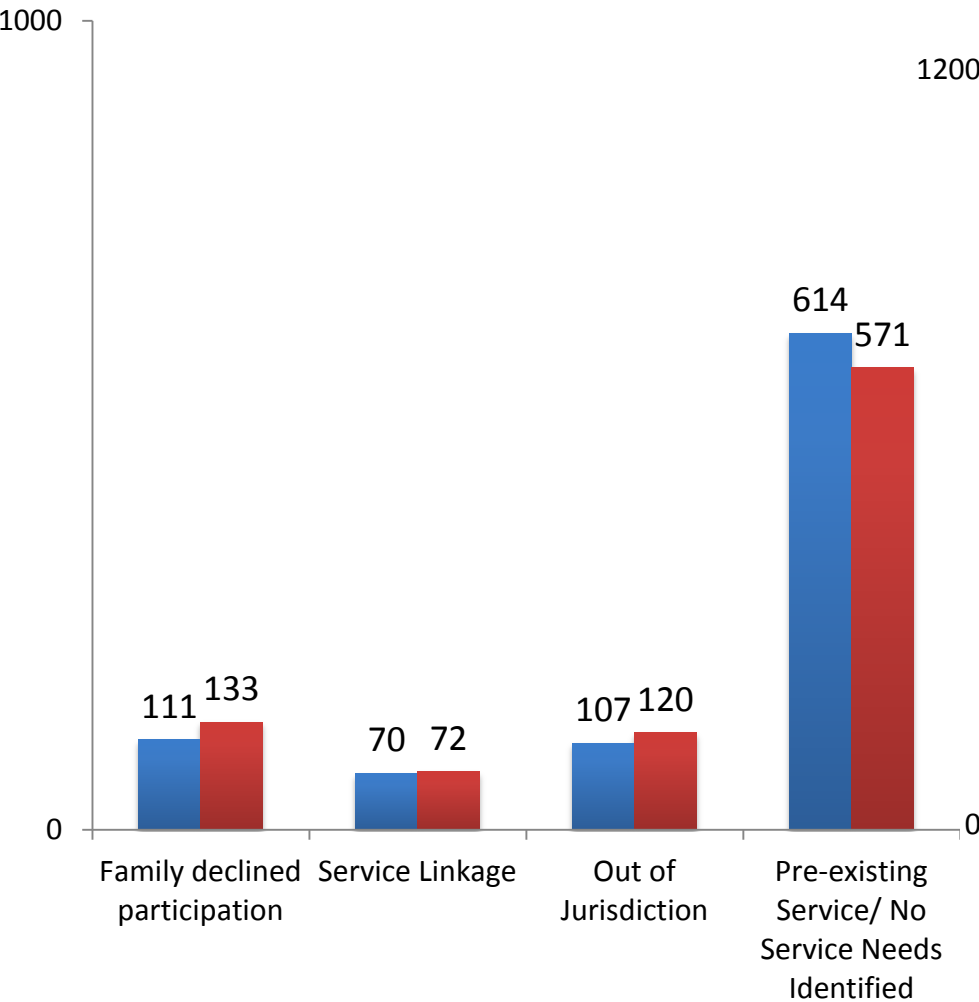

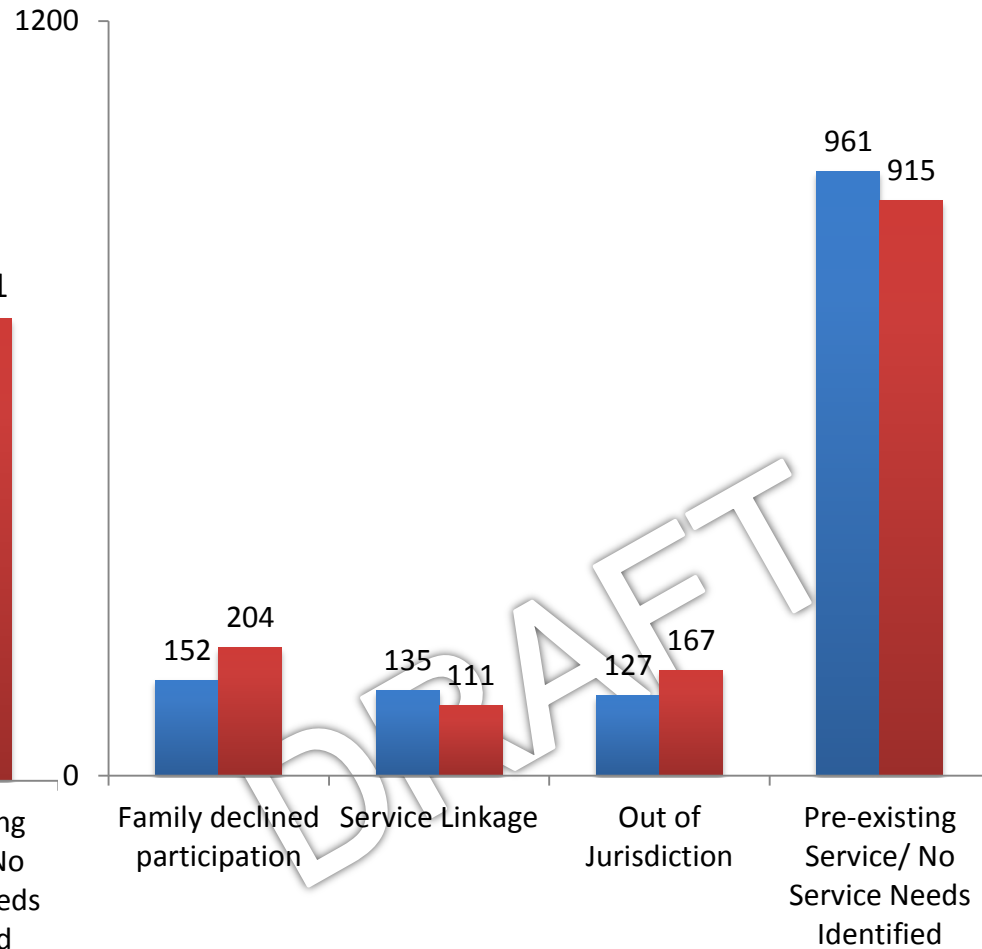

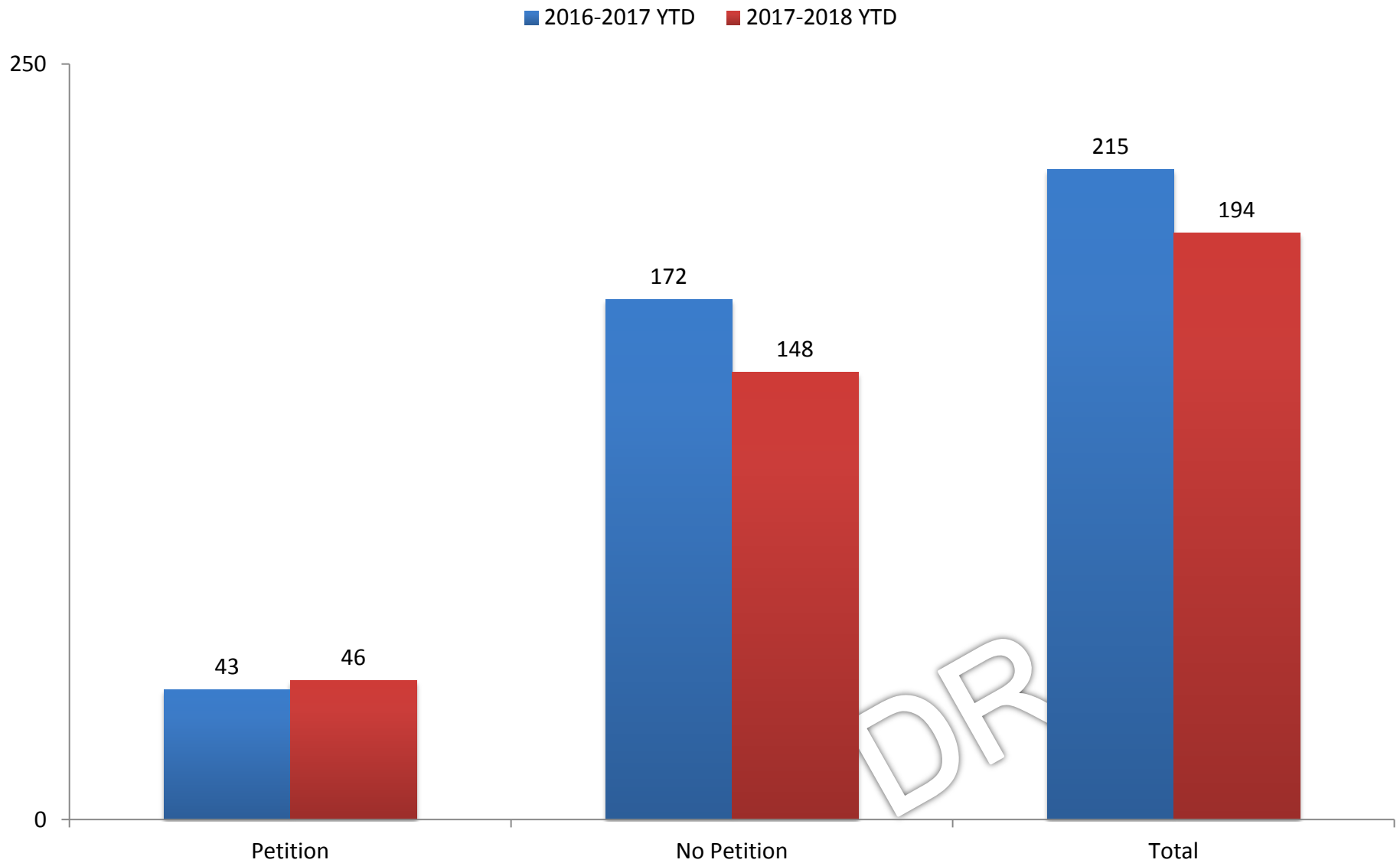
# CSSD Referral Sources

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## Key Outcome 5: Referrals to OAG

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# OAG Referral Defined

OAG - Juvenile Specialty Court Unit (JSCU) handles two types of referrals for chronically truant students in Family Court:

- Person in Need of Supervision (PINS), matters which consist of referrals sent by the schools to Court Social Services Division (CSSD) for students ages 13-17. OAG may file a petition (charges) against the student.
- Family Special Proceeding (FSP) cases, which are referrals sent by the schools directly to OAG for students ages 5-12. OAG may file a criminal information (charges) against the parent.

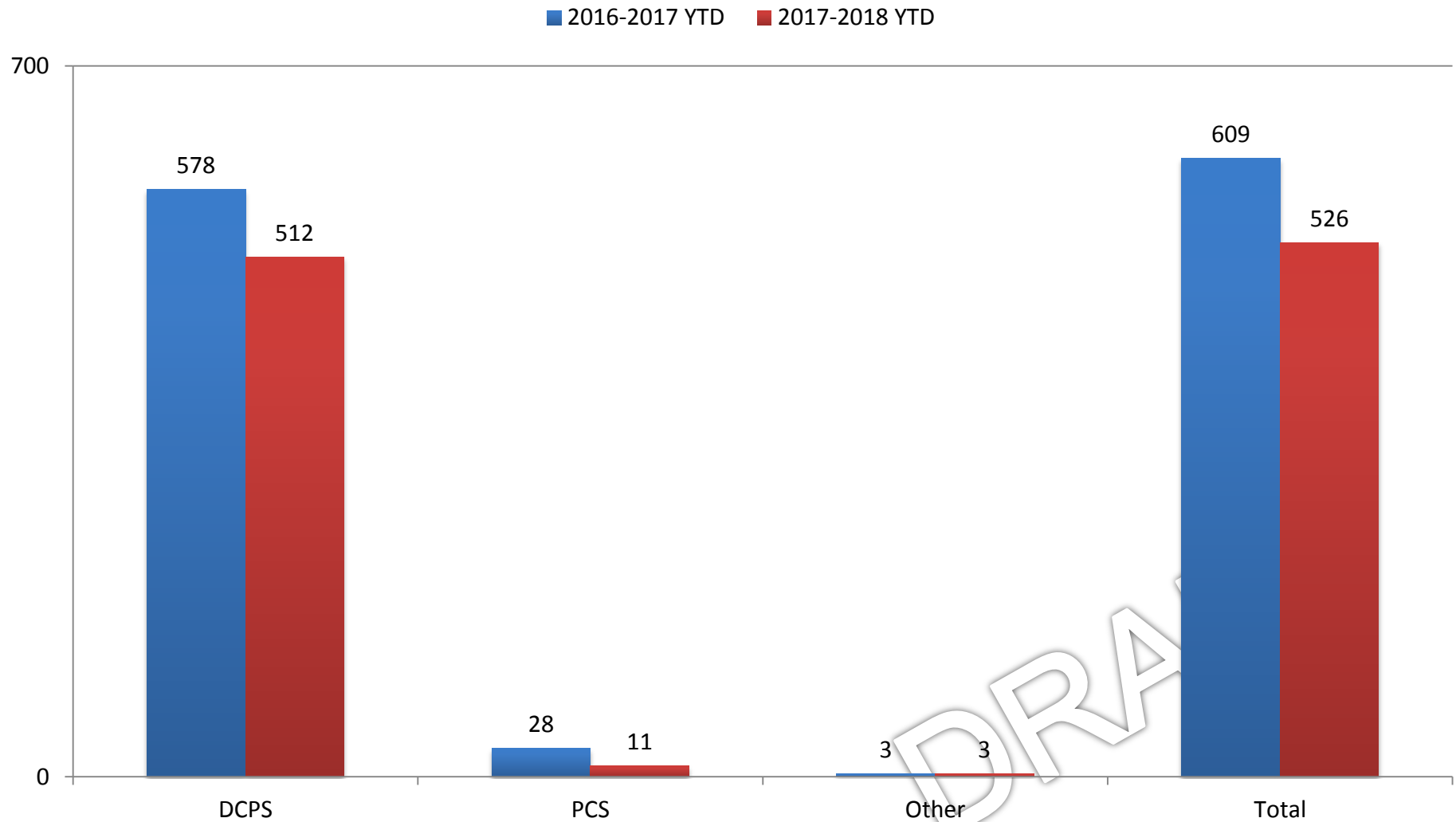
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# OAG No Paper Reasons

- **Diversion** - The case is eligible for petitioning but OAG exercises its discretion to send PINS cases to TRIAGE (Truancy Reduction Initiative And Gateway (to) Empowerment) for supportive interventions in lieu of prosecution;
- **Age** - Student is 18 years old or turning 18 in six months;
- **Insufficient Evidence** - Missing paperwork/technical mistakes;
- **Commitment** - Child or youth is already committed to Child and Family Services (CFSA) or Department of Youth and Rehabilitation Services (DYRS);
- **Under Court Supervision** - Child or youth has a current delinquency or PINS case; adult has a current neglect or FSP case.

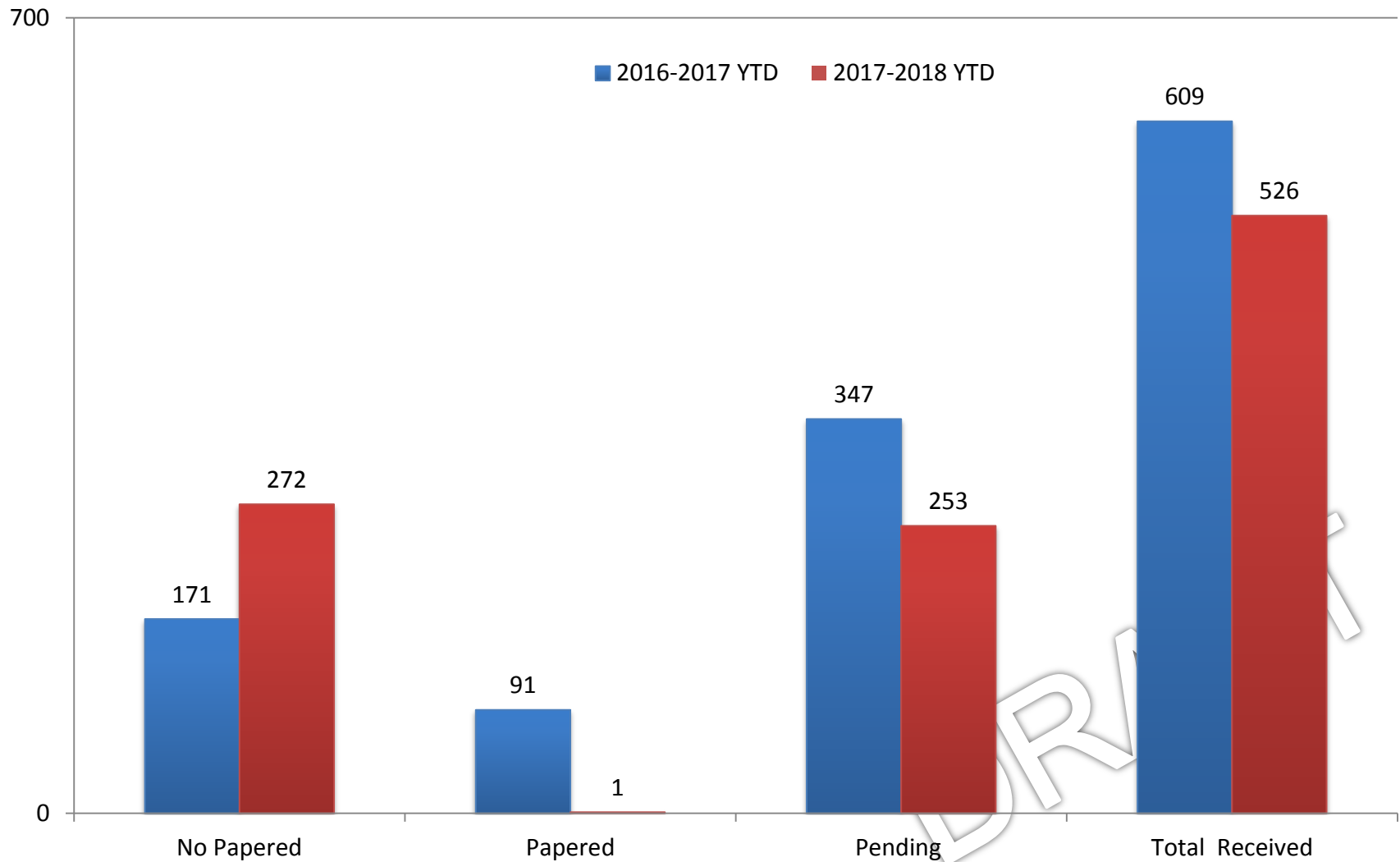
# FSP Referrals Received YTD



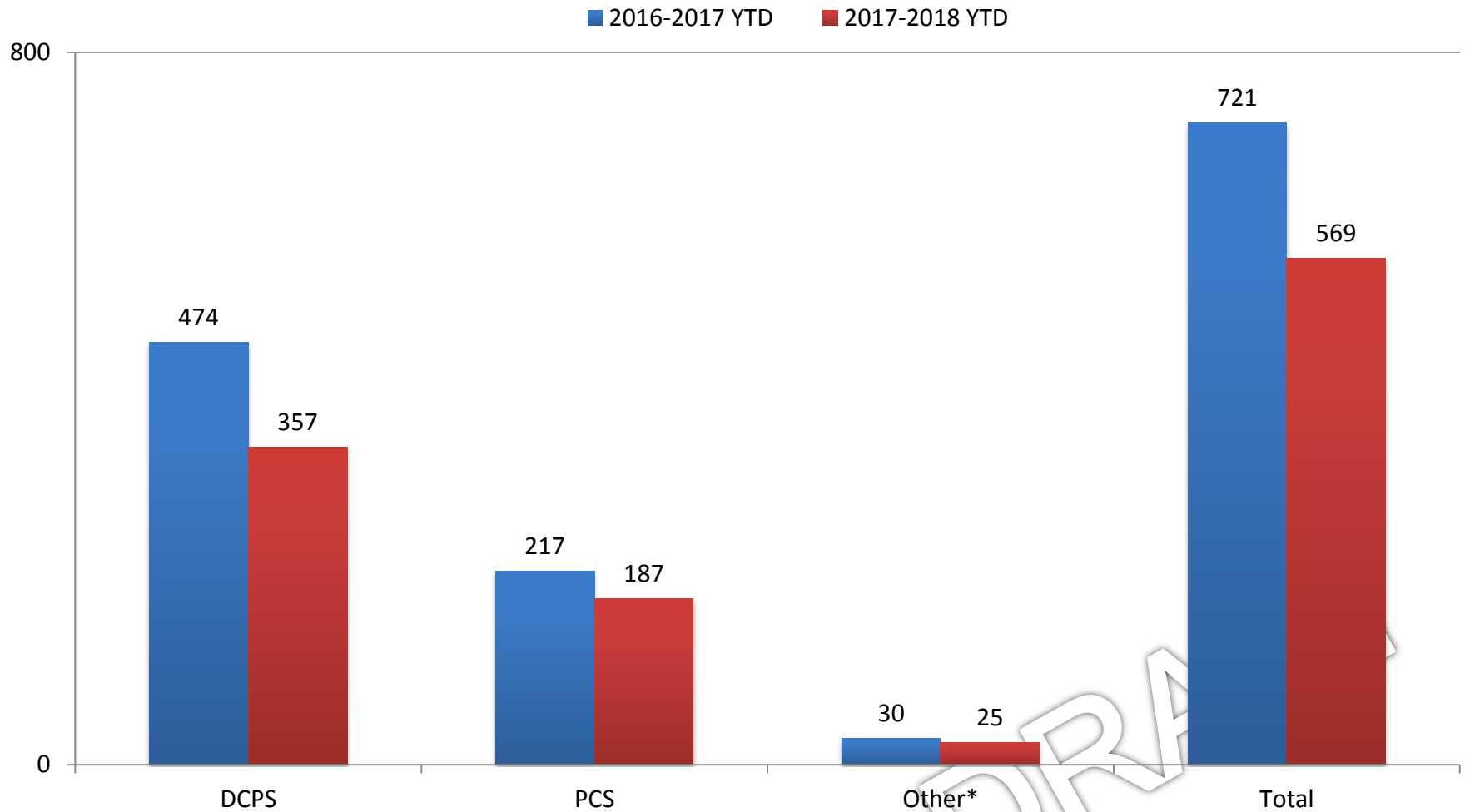

# Status of FSP Referrals Received



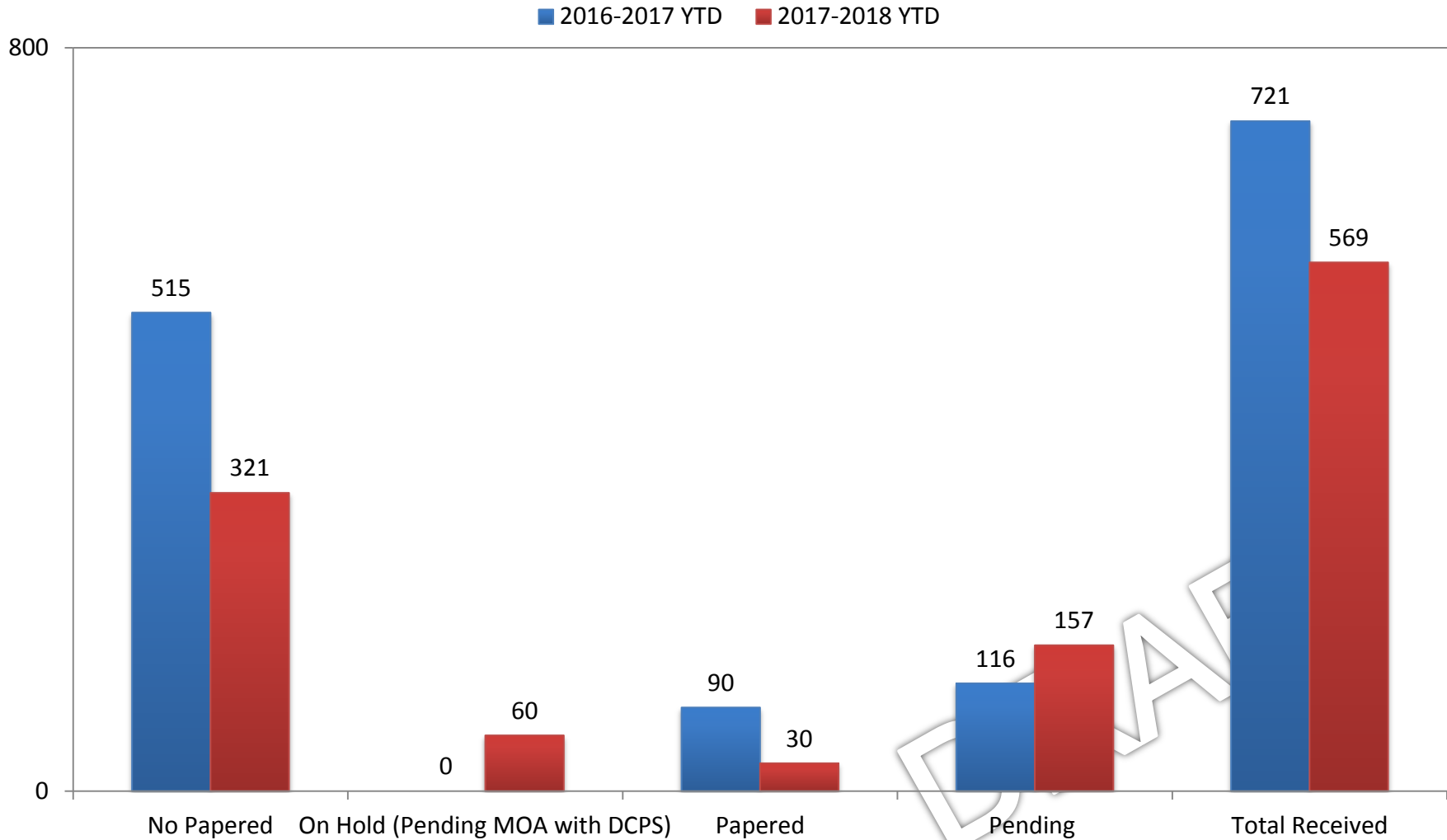
# PINS Referrals Received YTD

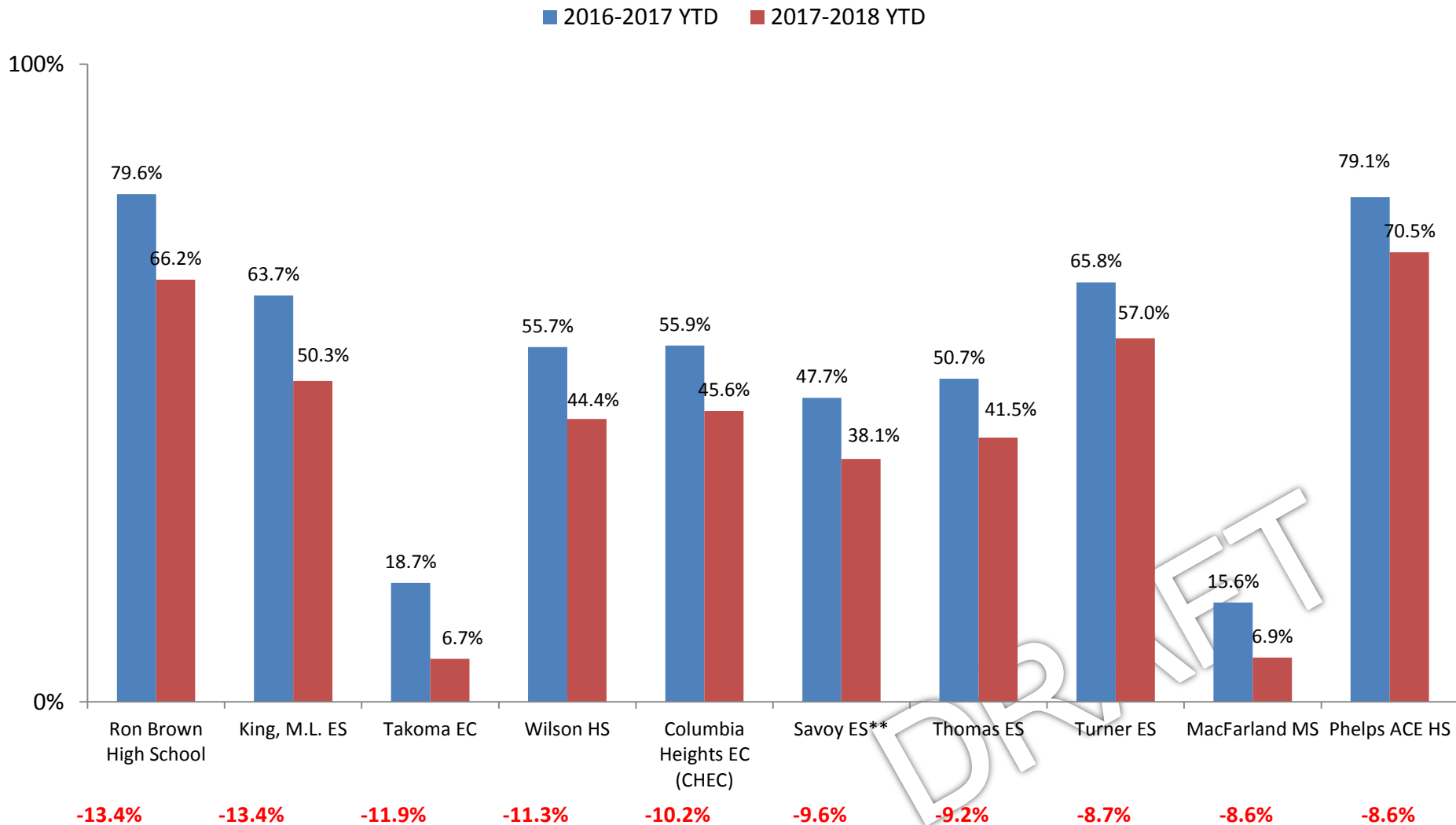

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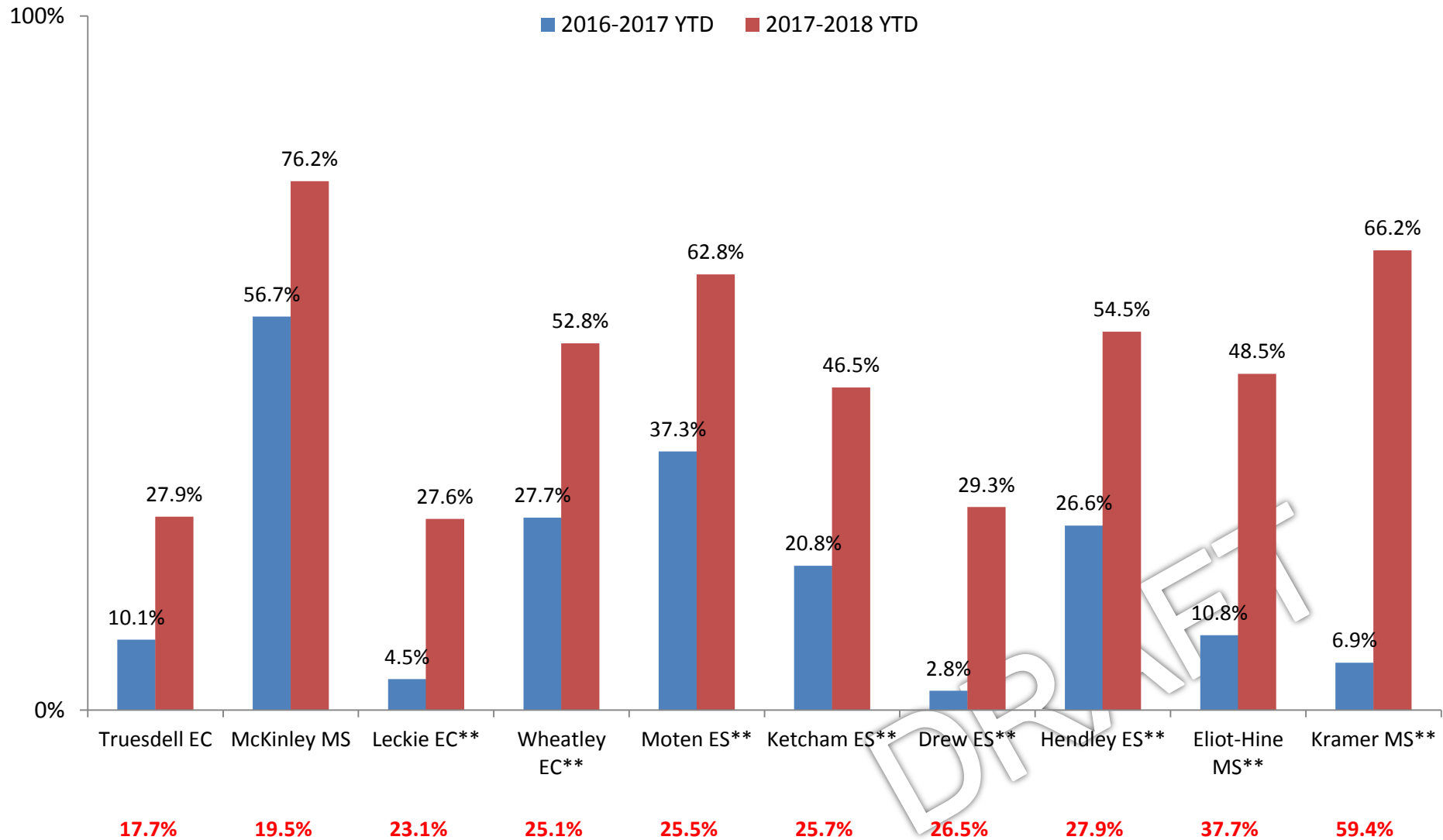
# DCPS with Largest Reductions in Truancy

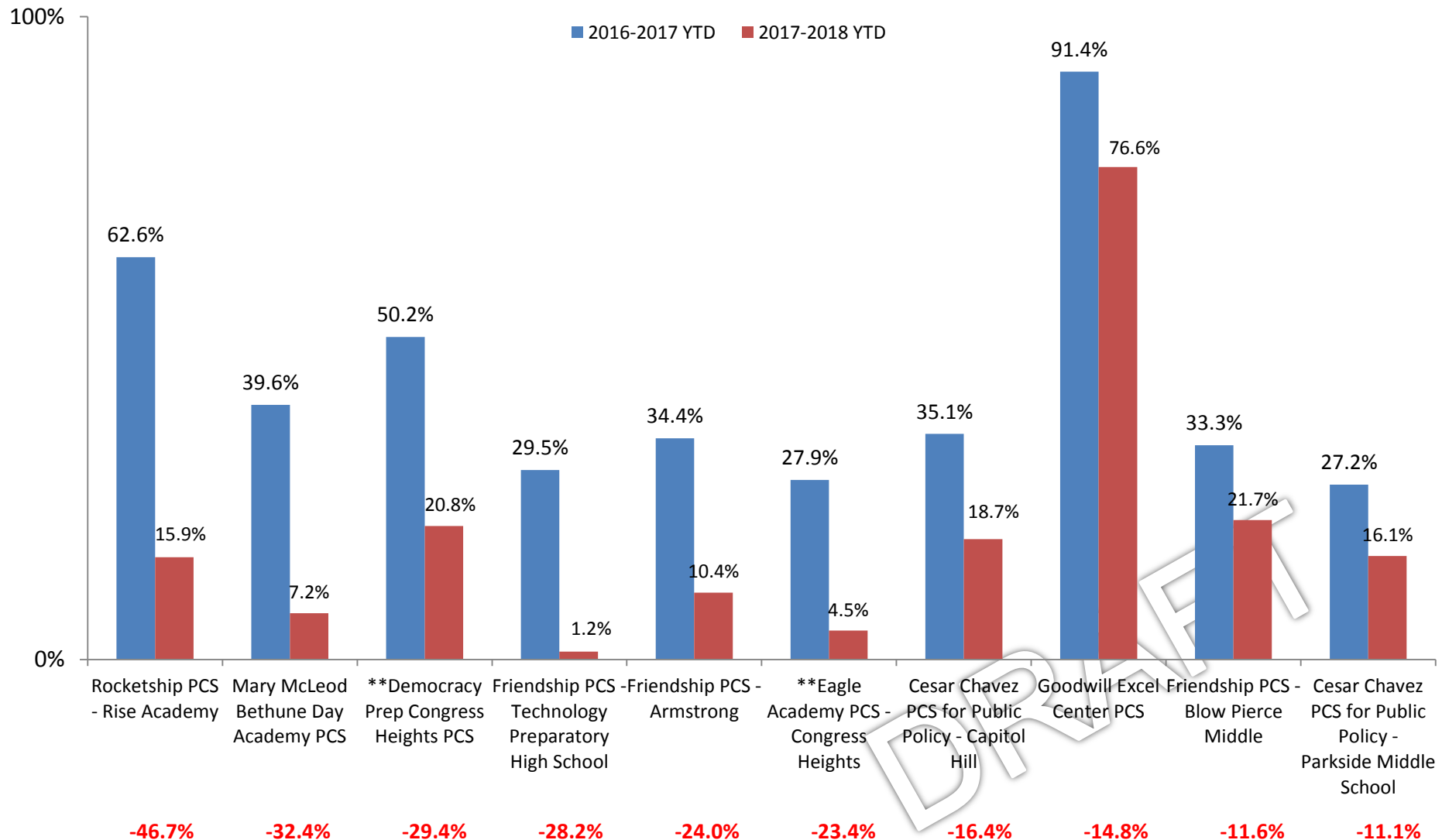


# DCPS with Largest Increases in Truancy



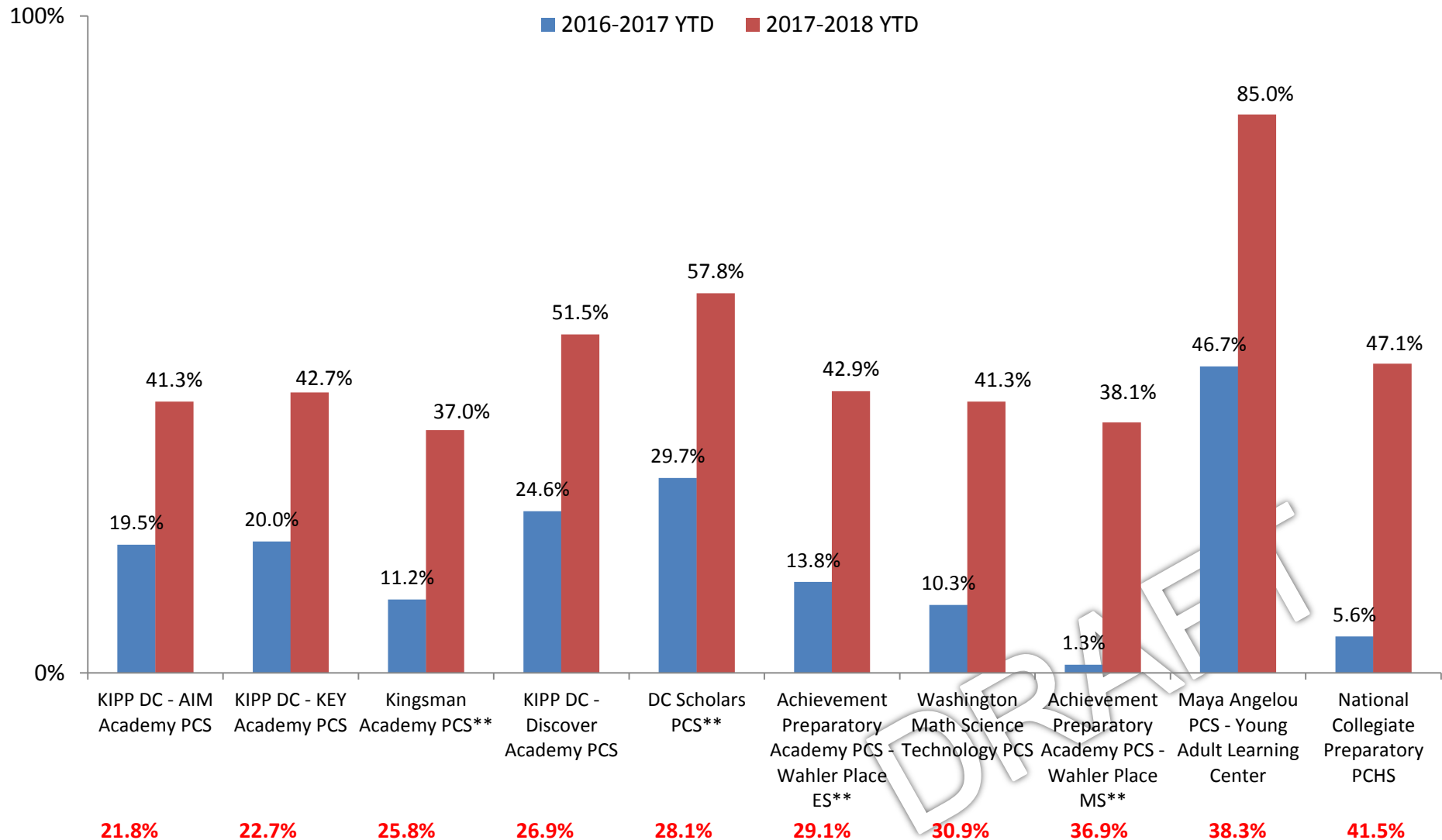
